The Challenges of Love

You can love someone, even if you don't approve of their conduct. Challenging? Yes. But if you have really taken the attitude of Christ to heart, you can love someone even if you don't approve of their actions. There is no higher model of this than God himself, who loved people who were ruining their lives by their sin. "While we were still sinners," God's love for us took redemptive direction. Yes, we can love those who are living in sin. (And, we will never reach them and help them without love.)

You can love someone, even if they hate you. Now, we go beyond just generic sin. When you are hated by someone, the devil wants to use that conflict – to pull you down into the pit of bitterness. When you discover someone hates you, the devil also discovers it and the devil will seek to pull you down into the pit of bitterness. In that pit, there is nothing good for you. There is no real satisfaction. There is no sweet revenge. There is only the ruin of bitterness and malice. Read Matthew 5:43-47. Jesus makes it clear, and all of Scripture makes it clear: hating people doesn't change people, but it certainly changes us. Hate is the plaque of the brain. And the only surgery to remove it is repentance. Hate doesn't really make you feel better. It doesn't help anyone. It brings no benefit. Jesus said – just don't do it.

You can love someone, even if they are better than you. There is something called Envy. Now, look back on that familiar page (1 Corinthians 13). Love does not envy. Socrates said, "Envy is the daughter of pride, the author of murder and revenge, the begetter of secret sedition, the perpetual tormenter of virtue. Envy is the filthy slime of the soul; a venom, a poison,

a quick-silver, which consumeth the flesh and drieth up the marrow of the bones."Webster says that envy is "chagrin or discontent at the excellence or good fortune of another; resentful, begrudging." The Bible says, "A sound heart is the life of the flesh: but envy the rottenness of the bones" (Proverbs 14:30). The writer of Proverbs also said envy is worse than wrath and anger (Proverbs 27:4). You cannot have envy in you, alongside the love, the agape, of 1 Corinthians 13.

You can love someone, even if they are different from you. A different color, different culture, different background, different economic status, different education, different looks, habits and interests. The earlier we learn this, the better – as Christians, together in the body of Christ – we are not all the same! Same faith. Same hope. Same allegiance to the same Savior. God wants us to love each other anyway. Read the chapter that comes right before 1 Cor. 13 (see 1 Cor. 12:12-26).

You can love someone, even if you are better. Now, comparing yourself to someone, with a competitive spirit – is not a recommended mode of thought. If you look at people, and immediately think comparatively - and focus on how much better you are ... that isn't a spiritually healthy mode of thinking. I can't recommend you develop that habit of thought where you compare yourself to others, and then think highly of yourself, because you are better. In the New Testament – that kind of immature perspective is described and condemned (Romans 12:3-8,16). it is written to instill in us, humility and patience and - to see ourselves, not in comparison to others. But rather, in proportion to our faith. "Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly. Never be wise in your own sight." The challenge here is – even if you think you are better than someone, don't be haughty and let that thought keep you from loving "the inferior." The self-interests of a

comparative and competitive view of people can hinder your capacity to love people.

If I'm actually better than someone, hate will only make me worse, not better. **1 Corinthians 13** tells me, love is not arrogant; is not rude; is patient. When I apply **1 Corinthians 13** to my heart – and when I imitate my Father – I'm able to love people, even if, in fact, I am better

"Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hope all things, endures all things." (1 Corinthians 13:4-7).

FORGIVENESS

"And whenever you stand praying, if you have anything against anyone, forgive him, that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses. But if you do not forgive, neither will your Father in heaven forgive your trespasses" (Mark 11:25-26).

Prayer is important throughout Mark's gospel.
Jesus, evidently an early riser, prayed alone (Mark 1:35). Then, sending His disciples away, Jesus "departed to the mountain to pray" (Mark 6:46). Finally, the prayers of Gethsemane (Mark 14:32-40) speak about faith in and commitment to the Father. Surely, Jesus' prayer life encourages us. And prayer should strengthen our faith. Prayer is not magic, or voodoo, and it should not be just wishful thinking.

A culture of prayer comes from God and His forgiveness. When we pray, we do so knowing that we can ask for forgiveness; we also should know that forgiving others will make our prayers real and meaningful. Refusing to forgive will destroy the strength and even the desire to pray. While standing to pray is common in the Bible (Psalm 134:1), even that posture means nothing if we are unwilling to forgive. Praying to God should flow from a heart attuned to Him, His glory, and His willingness to forgive; prayer that avails before God is prayer from the heart. Prayer brings God into our lives, whatever the situation may be.

The power of prayer is seen in the fact that we are to pray in Jesus' name. Ending a prayer "In the name of Jesus" is perfectly OK. But do we remember that when we say those words at the end of our prayers, we are recognizing the authority of Jesus? It is His will that must be done; it is His will that will be done. We need to go far beyond simply mouthing words that reflect little or no forethought in this act of worship, whether public or private. Jesus "ever lives to make intercession for us." He can do so; He is enthroned at the Father's right hand. He was here before us; He knows and understands far better than we.

Forgiving others is also a common theme in the Bible. Kingdom citizens, those who walk hand in hand with Jesus, in a covenant relationship with Him, are people who need forgiveness. They are people who should be willing to forgive. Jesus says that we have been forgiven much; how can we then refuse to forgive a little? Could it be that we want God's mercy, but are unwilling to extend mercy to others? The right attitude about prayer, however, can change the climate of prayer; right attitudes reflect changed hearts. What kind of heart does God have? God's heart is seen in a myriad of ways. But surely, we can see the heart of God when we see His Son hanging on the cross. God's heart hates sin. In fact, God hates sin so much that, in love, in forgiveness, He was willing for His Son to die.

"The only basis on which God can forgive us is the tremendous tragedy of the Cross of Christ. To base our forgiveness on any other ground is unconscious blasphemy. The only ground on which God can forgive our sin and reinstate us to His favor is through the Cross of Christ. There is no other way! Forgiveness, which is so easy for us to accept, cost the agony at Calvary" (Oswald Chambers, *My Utmost for His Highest*). Aren't we thankful that we have a God above, a God to whom we can pray?

- 1. First and foremost plan to be there at each and every meeting. What will occur in your life that will be more important than worshiping and studying with your brethren during those few days? What an encouragement you will be to others just by your presence and participation.
- 2. We must pray for the success of the meeting. We should pray for success in specific areas. Areas in

which we have extended effort.
