LIVING EVANGELISM

"Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)

Let me first explain the term I have used for a title. We all recognize our need to personally tell the gospel story to anyone who presents an opportunity (Acts 8:4; Gal. 6:10). We cannot create opportunities nor take advantage of those we see if our lives are not an example of what we are teaching.

This principle guides us in nearly all aspects of life. We do not seek life counseling from a homeless addict, nor financial advice from someone who has just completed filing for bankruptcy. We do not ask for advice on auto repairs from a person who has never owned or maintained a car. Just the opposite, we seek those whose lives indicate success in whatever field of endeavor we are pursuing.

What Jesus then says to us in our text is, the way our light shines and brings glory to the Father is if we live by such good works. Now this word good refers generally to things beautiful, noble, of good character. Things that are virtuous in nature. Jesus described such things in **Matthew 25:34-46**. There He describes the sheep who He identifies as the righteous who will go into eternal life as those who appropriately respond to the needs of those who are hungry, thirsty, strangers, naked, sick and those in prison. Caring for these would be indicative of a life devoted to good works. Those who do such would be not only pleasing to God but would be obvious to those who see them and glorify God.

That is the Christian who is like the expert mechanic we consult for advice on auto maintenance or the Doctor we consult about our health. They are folks who would be considered trustworthy in the eyes of anyone desiring to draw closer to God.

My purpose is not to make any of us feel badly, but to help us recognize how we are to become a trusted resource for friends, relatives and neighbors. Personal contact remains the number one way people are drawn to Christ. That is because they have met

someone they view as trustworthy with whom they can discuss spiritual issues.

When **Acts 8:4** describes those fleeing persecution as going *about preaching the word* we need to understand they were speaking to those who would trust them sufficiently to have the discussion of the gospel.

Yes, the gospel calls us into a covenant relationship with our Savior Who died for us as the One Who most severely suffered from persecution. And, as Peter tells us, and as Jesus warned His disciples, we are called to walk in His footsteps (John 15:18-20; 1 Pet. 2:21ff). But the reward is of such great value the temporary sacrifices of this life are but *light affliction* that our lives must speak this message as well as our words (2 Cor. 4:16-18; Rom. 8:18).

Let us then live lives that fit the description of living evangelism. Let us be a reflection of our Savior so it can be that we enable His promise to come to the lives of men. "Then Jesus again spoke to them, saying, "I am the Light of the world; he who follows Me will not walk in the darkness, but will have the Light of life."" (John 8:12)

The Pharisees

"Now they had been sent from the Pharisees.

They asked him, and said to him, "Why then are you baptizing, if you are not the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" John answered them saying, "I baptize in water, but among you stands One whom you do not know. It is He who comes after me, the thong of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." These things took place in Bethany beyond the Jordan, where John was baptizing" (John 1:24-29 NASV). The Pharisees would naturally be concerned about John the Baptist's preaching. He was not Messiah, but great crowds from Jerusalem and Judea flocked to him. John made it clear that the Messiah was coming; the one to come would be greater than John. John said that He alone is worthy of all things; I am unworthy. This stir

about the arrival of a teacher of some kind was enough for the Pharisees to come running, asking and demanded answers. They were also setting the stage for many tense encounters with God's Son.

Where and when did the Pharisees originate? Their historical roots can be traced to Alexander the Great and his efforts to *Hellenize* the world. After successful military conquests, begun by his father, Philip of Macedon, Alexander began to force the Greek way of life on a wide swath of conquered peoples. Schooled by Aristotle, Alexander believed the world would be a better place if it embraced Greek culture and spoke the Greek language. Large, influential cities, such as Alexandria, Egypt, fueled scientific and literary interests; in time, the LXX was produced in Alexandria. Alexander died in 323BC; yet, his influence was still being felt in the 1st c. In fact, many Jews had become Hellenists (Acts 6).

Jews, especially those who lived in Palestine, resisted the influence of Greek culture. Lax morality and a neglect of monotheism prompted the citizens of Judea to rebel. Barbarous acts by Antiochus Epiphanes (military leader from Alexander's army), such as desecration of the temple, forbidding circumcision, and extolling the Greek way of life, led to a number of revolts. The Maccabean revolt helped solidify opposition to Hellenism. Some Jews (priests) compromised with Antiochus; this fueled further fighting against the armies trying to take over Palestine. In time, the Pharisees, the Pious Ones, the Separated Ones, emerged as guardians of true unadulterated Judaism (at least in their view).

We generally think of the Pharisees as severe antagonists of Jesus. While true of many, it was not true of all Pharisees. Think of Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea. Jesus ate in the home of Simon the Pharisee. Others, though, rejected John and eventually rejected Jesus. "But the Pharisees and the lawyers rejected God's purpose for themselves, not having been baptized by John" (Luke 7:30). The opposition of the chief priests, scribes, elders, lawyers, and Pharisees to Jesus permeates the Gospels. Jesus often pointed out their hypocrisy, in spite of their good intentions to maintain the doctrinal purity of the Law (Matthew 15:1-9).

The Pharisees were on the alert for someone, whoever that might be, who came to take John's place. Eventually, for envy, they delivered Jesus to be crucified. They were still drinking out of a dirty cup.

Jesus on Handling Personal Conflicts

It is rather how we handle this natural conflict which will be either good or evil so Jesus has given us some instructions on how to handle personal conflicts.

Jesus' words on the matter are best summarized in Matthew 5:23f, "Therefore if you are presenting your offering at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your offering there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and present your offering." And in Matthew 18:15 "If your brother sins (against you, CR), go and show him his fault in private; if he listens to you, you have won your brother." These are dealing with possibly sinful situations so we are adapting the PRINCIPLE involved for if it works with sin it can certainly work with mere misunderstandings and differences of opinion which involve no sin!

First, if your friend has caused a rift between you two, then you are to go and talk to them. It's not easy, believe me I KNOW, but sometimes all you have to do is show you care and that in itself is enough to heal the rupture. It's easy to say "He caused it! He needs to come to ME!" but that's not what Jesus told us to do, is it?

In the Bible we can read where the authors of
