The Gospel is to be preached

Jesus preached the gospel of the kingdom - **Mat. 4:23**He told Nicodemus to be born again to enter the kingdom - **John 3:3-5**

Paul said redemption resulted in the forgiveness of sins and transferred us into the kingdom of His beloved Son Col. 1:13,14

Jesus then told His disciples to preach the gospel to all creation - Mark 16:15,16

Peter then, first accomplished this in **Acts 2:22-36**Peter then preached this gospel to the Gentiles **Acts 10:34-43**

This gospel was preached to the Ethiopian, to Saul of Tarsus who became the apostle Paul, to Lydia, a seller of purple and the Philippian jailer, all recorded in the Book of Acts.

In each case these people obeyed the gospel, repented of their sins and were baptized for the remission of those sins as they were redeemed by the blood of Christ.

Romans 3:23 tells us all men have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, therefore all men need redemption which is the process of having our sins forgiven. Without it we cannot enter the kingdom and cannot attain to salvation which leads to eternal life. Please consider your need for redemption and come hear these lessons and carefully consider what God has spoken to us in His word.

Things Which Make For Peace David Cox

"Therefore let us pursue the things which make for peace and the things by which one may edify another" (Romans 14:19). Among any group of people, there will be times that there will not be agreement on some issue. It is true in the family, in the workplace, in school, and in the church. Why is this the case? Because people are different. Even among the twelve, they had these moments (Mark 9:33-34; Matthew 20:24). Paul writing to the Romans is reminding them that they should work for peace. Why? So the church can be

edified, strengthened, and built up. Peace is absolutely necessary if we are to be successful in strengthening others and reaching others for Christ. Let us consider the things which will make for peace.

Resolve Conflict.

Conflict must be resolved if we are to have peace. The idea that we can just sweep conflict under the rug and go on to achieve peace is very shortsighted. Solomon writes, "The beginning of strife is like releasing water; Therefore stop contention before a quarrel starts" (Proverbs 17:14). The instruction of Solomon is to "stop contention." It is much easier to stop contention than to unravel a quarrel. The idea is that we should be seeking reconciliation, to be made friends again. We need to see the tragedy of allowing differences of opinion to destroy the work of God. Paul is saying that Christians should not let these things hinder the growth and development of the church. In resolving conflict, we will remove the trivial things from standing in our way. **Restrain Your Tongue.** The tongue can cause the greatest harm and can disrupt peace among people. We would do well to remember the instruction of James, "So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath" (James 1:19). James tells us to be "slow to speak," which is precisely restraining our tongue. The one pursuing peace will use his tongue to build up, instruct, and not to belittle, teardown, or win the argument. It is just not worth the disruption of peace and the edification of the church. Actively Pursue Peace. As the people of God, we need to be peace- makers with everyone (Romans 12:18). We must be proactive in creating an atmosphere of peace. This is done as we invest time with God. Take time to read the scriptures and meditate

Take time to read the scriptures and meditate on them. Pray to God for yourself and for others. Take time to focus on the mission that God has given us to do. When peace seems to be almost unfathomable, continue to pursue peace in doing these things. Take the time to follow these things that make for peace. It will draw you closer to God and closer together. Peace will allow you to grow and be an influence on those you are around for good. Remember, Jesus taught, "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called sons of God" (Matthew 6:9).

A Few Words about the "Social Gospel" Edward O. Bragwell, Sr.

We "conservatives" sometimes speak of the "Social Gospel" in a way that shows we know very little about it. Many think the Social Gospel is all about churches

sponsoring social activities like social meals and recreational activities. While these unscriptural practices are wrong and may have in some way grown out the social gospel movement, they are not at the core of it.

Historically the social gospel was a Protestant movement that began in the later part if the nineteenth century and became a strong influence during the beginning years of the twentieth century. It was started by classic theological liberals (classic Modernists) who basically lost faith in the hereafter and tried to make preaching and the church still relevant by making them a means of improving the present world order (the here and now).

Its influence continues to shape the religious thinking, preaching, and church practice of many in this country. The shifted emphasis and focus of the gospel and churches from saving souls and preparing them for heaven to that of social reform and the betterment of society is seen everywhere. The role of Jesus as the Savior has been replaced with Jesus as a mere wise man whose teaching will make a better society. The theory involves the notion that the problem of sin is caused by the corruption and inequities of our social systems. The solution is to produce a better world order and the problem of sin will diminish. The emphasis in preaching is turned to social reform and away to from personal conversion to Christ.

Emphasizing salvation from poverty and inequity, rather than salvation from sin and its temporal and eternal consequences is the present order. Another way of putting it is that the focus has shifted from pursuing heaven and avoiding hell, by overcoming personal sin through the gospel, to making a better life in the here and now. The reason little is preached about heaven and hell is either that they no longer believe in them or if they still do believe they think that virtually no one is in danger of hell and that everyone is going to heaven.

The social gospel's shift is often so subtle that it is hard for us to see. Sure, the gospel addresses a Christian's behavior in this present world (**Titus 2:11**, **12**), but in the context of how these things affect his pursuit of the future world (v. 13).

Think of the themes and topics for "gospel meetings," "seminars," "specials" and even "Sunday sermons" that you see from churches. How many of them suggest that they will be addressing matters of spiritual and eternal import or will it be matters that are basically designed primarily to improve life in the here and now? Will there be lessons from the Bible designed to tell how to better prepare for heaven, or will they be more designed to take the Bible as a manual for their physical and social betterment? Even when the gospel

does address Christians' responsibilities in the home, the community, or work place, it is not that improvement in these areas is an end within itself, but as a part of living here in a way that prepares one to live in heaven in the hereafter.

I suspect that we all may have been influenced by the social gospel concept that we realized and need to be careful to preach the gospel as the apostles preached it. Church sponsored social activities may be a spin-off from the social gospel, but the social gospel manifests itself in far more ways than that.

The Wooden Bowl (a Grimm fairy tale)

A frail old man went to live with his son, daughter-inlaw, and four-year old grandson. The old man's hands trembled, his eyesight was blurred, and his step faltered. The family ate together at the table but the elderly grandfather's shaky hands and failing sight made eating difficult. Peas rolled off his spoon onto the floor. When he grasped the glass, milk spilled on the tablecloth. The son and daughter-in-law became irritated with the mess. "We must do something about Grandfather," said the son. "I've had enough of his spilled milk, noisy eating, and food on the floor."

So the husband and wife set a small table in the corner. There, Grandfather ate alone while the rest of the family enjoyed dinner. Since Grandfather had broken a dish or two, his food was served in a wooden bowl. When the family glanced in Grandfather's direction sometimes he had a tear in his eye as he sat alone. Still, the only words the couple had for him were sharp admonitions when he dropped a fork or spilled food. The four-year-old watched it all in silence.

One evening before supper, the father noticed his son playing with wood scraps on the floor. He asked the child sweetly, "What are you making?" Just as sweetly, the boy responded, "Oh, I am making a little bowl for you and Mama to eat your food when I grow up." The four-year-old smiled and went back to work. The words so struck the parents that they were speechless. Then tears started to stream down their cheeks. Though no word was spoken, both knew what must be done.

That evening the husband took Grandfather's hand and gently led him back to the family table. For the remainder of his days, he ate every meal with the family. And for some reason, neither husband nor wife seemed to care any longer when a fork was dropped, milk spilled, or the tablecloth soiled.

Two Lessons: 1) Children are remarkably perceptive.

Their eyes ever observe, their ears ever listen, and their minds ever process the messages they absorb. If they see us patiently provide a happy home atmosphere, they will imitate that attitude for the rest of their lives. 2) God's instructions about honoring our parents never ends.
