# "BE WHERE YOUR FEET ARE"

A very unique and interesting expression I have heard more than once recently. It seems this means to be sufficiently confident in what you believe about yourself that you remain uninfluenced by those around you. Kind of saying we are secure in who we really are. This brings to my mind two passages of Scripture that should reflect on this for the child of God. First, ""I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself up for me." (Galatians 2:20) Of course this passage represents a commitment to following Christ. Seeing His footsteps as a guide for our lives. Next, "Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth. For you have died and your life is hidden with Christ in God." (Colossians 3:2-3)

These two passages tell us where our feet are. Who we are and what we plan to do with our lives. When Jesus corrected His disciples who desired places of rank in His kingdom, He reminded them the people of the world, the Gentiles, are lorded over by their rulers. ""It is not this way among you, but whoever wishes to become great among you shall be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you shall be your slave; just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."" (Matthew 20:26–28) Jesus came to serve mankind. It required sacrificing His life to accomplish God's will in that regard.

Now, let us ask ourselves if we, indeed, know where our feet are and are committed to a life of service in His kingdom, a life that places that service above our very lives (1 Pet. 2:21-24).

In Jesus' great teaching He often made plain the level of commitment it took to follow Him. Remember

the rich young ruler who turned away when he saw the cost of discipleship? Notice the extent of Jesus teaching in **John 13:34,35.** Here He teaches His disciples to love one another as He has loved them. If we read this text too quickly, we may miss the fact that His love for them led Him to Calvary. If we are to demonstrate His love to the world as He teaches in this text, that love carries a commitment that exceeds even life on earth.

It is then we can see the necessity of Christ living in us (Rom. 8:9,10). The things above, that is God, heaven and His will must be the most important things in our lives.

The application of this principle to our lives then means we must put His cause above all earthly relationships. That is what He means when He speaks of bringing a sword and separating family members (Mat. 10:34-39). His cause will create problematic relationships between those who are totally committed to Him and those who are not.

This is the depth of the relationship between the apostle Paul and Christ that led him to say prior to his death, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith; in the future there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day; and not only to me, but also to all who have loved His appearing." (2 Timothy 4:7–8) The only fitting epitaph for the child of God.

The life Paul lived can be attained when we think like he and our Lord thought. "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed to us. For the anxious longing of the creation waits eagerly for the revealing of the sons of God." (Romans 8:18–19)

Know who you are and live accordingly.

# **Expelling Unbelief**

The world is full of skeptical unbelief when it comes to Scripture. This unbelief can even creep into the church. The creation account is mocked and compromised. The resurrection of the dead is mocked and compromised. Judgment day is mocked and compromised. "Well, it doesn't mean what it says." Why not? Why can people, even some Christians, not simply believe what Scripture says? Well, because it's unbelievable!

How can we believe the unbelievable? We can learn from those who expelled their unbelief, like Abraham. While he is the father of the faithful, that does not mean that he did not have bouts of unbelief. He certainly did. Let's look at his life, especially focusing on **chapter 17**. The Lord, once again, tells Abraham that he would have children, this time specifying it would be through Sarah. "Then Abraham fell on his face and laughed, and said in his heart, 'Shall a child be born to a man who is one hundred years old? And shall Sarah, who is ninety years old bear a child?" (vs. 17). The whole thing seemed unbelievable, and Abraham laughed at it. Why?

- •It is fantastic! God created man from dirt? Jonah was swallowed by a fish? A virgin gave birth? The Son of God died? And was resurrected? Why are all of these treated as mere fantasies? It is because they are fantastic. Why did Abraham not initially believe? For the same reason.
- •Have you seen us? What must Abraham and Sarah have looked like? Old? Weathered? Wrinkled? And they would have a child? "Have you seen what we look like?" They were, "as good as dead" (Heb. 11:12). Can the "as good as dead" come back to life? It seemed unbelievable to Abraham.
- •It hasn't happened yet! Abraham is 99 years old ch. 17. The initial promise of descendants had happened 24 years prior. How long had Sarah been barren? Longer than that. "Sarah's going to have a child." Uh, yeah, they had undoubtedly been trying in the decades gone by. Why have doubts now? Well, it hadn't happened yet.

What happens when people, like Abraham, disbelieve? They cling to lies rather than the truth (12: 10-20). They use their wisdom to try to fulfill God's promises (16). They bring others into their sin (Pharaoh, Sarah, Hagar, Abimelech). All in all, it is just a mess.

But Abraham would learn. He would expel his

disbelief. We see it in **ch. 22** as God commanded him to offer up Isaac. Abraham had not believed before, falling on his face laughing. He's not laughing now. He is believing. Why? Hebrews says that he was, "concluding that God was able to raise him up, even from the dead..." (11:19). How could he believe that? Why could he believe?

- God had done it before Abraham had seen the dead come back to life. Isaac was proof of that. Dead wombs had been given life.
- The promise had been made If the Seed would come through Isaac, and Isaac died childless, he would have to be raised from the dead.
- Nothing is too hard for God God was able (Gen. 18:13). Nothing is too fantastic for God. Believe it. Some people will only believe God's power if they see

Some people will only believe God's power if they see it for themselves (Jn. 20:25). For us, that's not how faith works (Heb. 11:1). Whether it is creation, judgment, or the resurrection, we better expel our disbelief. Abraham did.
