"HEAR YE HIM"

"While he was yet speaking, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them: and behold, a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him." (Matthew 17:5)

This text provides the answer God gave from heaven when mankind in the person of the apostle Peter thought his idea would be pertinent in the midst of a miraculous lesson being taught.

Difficulties listening to God rather than man goes back a long way in our history. Certainly Adam and Eve listened to the thoughts of Satan and viewed them as greater than the words God had spoken. Noah preached of the impending judgment upon mankind as the wrath of God would bring the great flood on the earth, yet no one listened to God's word then either. The children of Israel pleaded with Moses to receive the words of God and then relay them to the people to avoid hearing His powerful voice speak directly to them at Mount Sinai.

It seems there is always some aversion to hearing God's message. And it appears it is because there are responsibilities that prevent us from doing what we choose.

In our formative years there were always layers of authority that determined what voice we listened to and obeyed. There were our parents, the school administrators and yes even officers of the law. Each had their own specific area of life in which their authority was supreme. In our home our father was the final arbiter of what was right or wrong for us to do. What was enlightening was how he determined those things. He first consulted God's word in the planning and organization of our lives. But while God was the supreme authority, he recognized authority that God has given to man and we were expected to respect it also.

He taught us that very form of reasoning and even was clear in teaching us that if those in authority in civil matters in life ever called upon us to violate what God demanded of us, we were to listen to God as the supreme authority.

Now most brethren and even folks who have no relationship with God understand the hierarchy. But that authority is often disregarded at any level, civil, criminal or spiritual when it calls for us to deny ourselves and obey the authority.

The discipline required to obey the Lord in **Matthew 16:24,25** is very difficult to achieve if indeed we are not desirous of *"winning the race"* **(1 Cor. 9:24-27)** Until we can truly desire that which is spiritual above that which is earthly, fleshly and of course temporal, we cannot be consistent in hearing the message of God.

The only way we will hear Him instead of the voices speaking to our fleshly interests is when we truly begin to long for and look to those things above rather than those things here below **(Colossians 3:1-4).**

One final point and plea to you who would truly seek the Lord and His interests. There are going to be many opportunities to worship with brethren near you as gospel meetings come along this time of year. Avail yourself of such a spiritual feast as will be offered in each of those occasions. Discipline yourself for the spiritual exercise demanded to strengthen and sustain your soul.

If you truly love the Lord your God will all your heart and soul and mind, this will be your pleasure.

Interpersonal relationships are crucial to us as human beings. One of the first statements of God regarding us was, *"It is not good that man should be*

alone" (Genesis 2:18). But, sometimes relationships, as important as they are, are challenging to maintain—even among Christians. There are times when brothers and sisters in Christ don't get along with one another.

One of the greatest skills necessary in those moments is the very one that is often not found: the ability to actually listen to others in conflict. So often, we formulate preconceived ideas about what someone thinks, what their motivations are, what they are really getting at; then, our reactions are based not on what they are saying or doing, but on our preconceptions of what they are thinking and meaning. As a result, communication stops, and conflict arises. This happens in homes, in churches, in businesses—everywhere there are people.

What can we do about this?

"So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; for the wrath of man does not produce the righteousness of God" (James 1:19-20).

Within the context, James is likely addressing our need to listen to God and His instructions to us, but it certainly also has great application in our relationships with one another. How much we would be helped if we slowed down and just listened! Not formulated rebuttal! Not vent all my frustrations! Not psychoanalyze my opponent at the moment! Not even view the one with whom I am in conflict as my opponent! Saber rattling really does little good in such moments other than encourage the one with whom we disagree to rattle their back at us. Here's a crazy idea: simply listen. Take it in. Seek to understand. Not necessarily agree; just understand.

Something radical might happen if we would only do this. We might find we don't disagree. At the least, perhaps we would find we are a lot closer to them than we think. God urged Israel in **Isaiah 1:18**, *"Come, let us reason together."* May God help us to have the same attitudes as husband and wives, parents and children, elders and congregations, and brothers and sisters in Christ.

What a wonderful resolution it would be to listen and

think about what others are saying more. What a wonderful resolution it would be to stop shaking our fists so much and open our ears more. We would likely find that God's ways are actually better than man's wrath at bringing about peace.

Living in the Danger Zone

As our generally ungodly society progressively worsens, it should be no surprise' to see individuals who wear the name "Christian" also heading in this direction. Some have the attitude "how close can I get to sin without sinning? Just how much can I get away with? How little can I do and be pleasing to God?" Thus, being influenced by the world, they are <u>living in</u> <u>the danger zone</u>. The eternal welfare of their soul is jeopardized. May I suggest some areas where the influence of the world is great and a word of caution is needed.

(1) Evil companions. Paul forewarned in **1 Corinthians 15:33**, "Do not be deceived: bad company corrupts good morals." The people Paul had in mind may not have been "absolute filth." Maybe his warning simply had to do with spending too much time with folks who have no redeeming spiritual qualities or Godward inclinations. Being distracted from our spiritual warfare allows Satan an opportunity to take advantage of us. He will use <u>anything</u> or <u>anybodv</u> he can to accomplish his purposes. Letting others determine your behavior or do your thinking for you is quite perilous spiritually. If you're in need of some good companionship, and we all are, why not spend your time with brothers and sisters in the Lord?

(2) <u>Media indulgence</u>. The information we filter through our mind undoubtedly affects the way we think and behave. To continually fill our minds with the world's philosophy is quite harmful whether by television, radio, movies or magazines. Seeing or hearing that which is <u>immoral</u> filth has no redeeming value. Also, we must be careful not to take a lighthearted or tolerant attitude toward sin when we witness it.

(3) <u>Immodesty</u>. It's hard to feel comfortable when you "stick out like a sore thumb" in a crowd, but the Christian must, if the majority does evil. Regardless of the world's standard of dress, Christians must adorn themselves in a manner which reflects the proper attitude of heart. **(1 Tim. 2:9,10)** The sacrifice of comfort and peer acceptance is a small price to pay in glorifying God. Beware of the dangers associated with immodest dress, evil influence, lust, sexual promiscuity, etc.

(4) "<u>And things like these</u>." **(cf. Gal. 5:19-21)** Alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, narcotics, modern forms of dance. Being engaged in these practices cannot strengthen us spiritually. They will only weaken us. Any small participation in or even too much association with these practices hurls one into the danger zone spiritually.

Beware of living in the Danger Zone! "*Abstain from every form of evil.*" (1 Thess. 5:22)

The world is doomed. All of the material things of this world will be destroyed. But not just that. John adds, *"And also its lusts"* (1 John 2:17). All of the worldly desires are doomed too.
