GOD OPPOSES SIN, DO WE?

It seems man is fully capable of recognizing his enemies. Clearly those who do things either not in our best interest or things that harm us are identified as such. God recognizes sin and the sinner and considers them to be the prisons and actions of enemies to His cause. If we are to claim allegiance to God we must agree with His position on sin.

I remember an old saying uttered for its humorous value, "All fishermen are liars except me and thee, and I'm not too sure about thee." I now wonder if the same could be spoken about those who, like God, hate sin. We see a world where many compromise daily with the temptations proffered by Satan. It seems even those who do not yield to the temptation often refuse to take an outspoken position against it.

Has religion become negotiable? While the word religious is usually associated with the spiritual relationship of mortal to deity, it does have a generic meaning. This meaning is then applied to our spiritual relationship with God. One of its definitions is, "Having thorough and genuine fidelity; strict in performance; conscientious; a *religious* loyalty." Now if we apply the word religious to our relationship with God almighty, does this definition fit? Remember God hates sin and wickedness, **Psa. 45:7** Thou hast loved righteousness, and hated wickedness: Therefore God, thy God, hath anointed thee With the oil of gladness above thy fellows.

The examples of faithful men in the Bible are those who hated sin, even when they found themselves guilty of it. **2 Sam. 12:9** Wherefore hast thou despised the word of Jehovah, to do that which is evil in his sight? thou hast smitten Uriah the Hittite with the sword, and hast taken his wife to be thy wife, and hast slain him with the sword of the children of Ammon.

2 Sam. 12:13 And David said unto Nathan, I have sinned against Jehovah. And Nathan said unto David, Jehovah also hath put away thy sin; thou shalt not die. Consider the reaction of Joseph to the temptation placed before him by Potiphar's wife. Gen. 39:9 he is not greater in this house than I; neither hath he kept back anything from me but thee, because thou art his

wife: how then can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?

Yet, as we observe the lives of those who we consider "religious" before God, we often see this willingness to compromise with Satan, the prince of the powers of the air. (Eph. 2:2) For instance men seem to enjoy being in the presence of temptation rather than resisting it. Many of the examples I will cite have been commented on for many years now. We have been continually warned of Satan's plots. They are just becoming more and more egregious. It is a given that most of the movies produced for television or the theater are filled with immoral language, conduct and scenes intended to appeal to sensual desires. But just in case you opt for a program that is appropriate you will see commercials selling sensuality just like the aforementioned movies.

It is not just sensuality that is running amuck, it is also greed and hatred for others. Consider the words of the wise man, Prov. 6:16 There are six things which Jehovah hateth; Yea, seven which are an abomination unto him: 17 Haughty eyes, a lying tongue, And hands that shed innocent blood; 18 A heart that deviseth wicked purposes, Feet that are swift in running to mischief, 19 A false witness that uttereth lies, And he that soweth discord among brethren. Every day men are encouraged to take every advantage in business dealings to come out ahead. It is no wonder then that one spreads or enhances a rumor about another to gain the promotion at work. Or someone actually places another's life in danger to help himself advance his career. People regularly orchestrate events that harm others while helping self. No doubt fraud and lying have become commonplace in business and government in an attempt to achieve. We even see in the church from time to time those who would, sow discord among the brethren, for a variety of reasons.

Have we devolved in our relationship to God as the Pharisees did? Are we at the point with religion that we could be described as *like unto whited sepulchers?* Are

we only concerned with the appearance we present to others? Maybe as the wise man says we are actually envious of the earthly gain of those who have openly rejected God. **Prov. 23:17** Let not thy heart envy sinners; But be thou in the fear of Jehovah all the day long:

Or are we truly religious in our relationship to God? Do we have a "thorough and genuine fidelity"; are we "conscientious"; do we have a "religious loyalty"? If so, we will be found worthy to inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world (Mat. 25:34) We will be those who hearth these words of mine and doth them shall be likened unto a wise man who built his house upon the rock (Mat. 7:24) If so, it will be truly said of us as the writer of Hebrews spoke, Heb. 12:1 Therefore let us also, seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us. We will not have to hear Him say, I never knew you, depart from me, ye that work iniquity (Mat. 7:23)

Genesis 1: Literal Days or Long Ages?

The 'Day/Age' Theory argues that each of the days in **Genesis 1** were actually long ages of time. This, of course, is an attempt to harmonize Biblical teaching of a young earth with the false claims of some scientists who claim our earth and universe are billions of years old. Here are some simple affirmative arguments to prove that the days of creation in **Genesis 1** were literal 24 hour days rather than long ages of time:

- 1) God defined His own terms in **Genesis 1:5**. "And God called the light Day and the darkness he called Night. And the evening and the morning were the first day." A period of light followed by a period of darkness constituted a day. Unless someone wants to argue that it stayed light for long periods and then stayed dark for long periods (which, of course, poses huge difficulties), we will have to stand upon this clear statement and conclude that the days really were literal 24 hour days. Furthermore, **Genesis 1:14-18** mentions the sun and moon and stars, and says they were made to be "for signs, and for seasons, and for days, and years." If we are to believe that the days were actually long ages of time, then what were the seasons and years?
- 2) Romans 1:20 says, "Since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities his eternal power and divine nature have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made" (NIV). This verse claims that someone has been here to see and understand God's power ever since the creation of the world. This poses no problem to those of us who believe that man was created within the same actual week that everything else was created. But, those who want to believe that

each day represents a long "age" have a problem. If man was created eons after the other elements of creation were formed, then this makes no sense. This line of reasoning is confirmed by Jesus' own statement in Mark 10:6. "From the beginning of the creation God made them male and female." The day/age theory places man at the end of millions or billions of years of geologic time. It light of these verses, it cannot be true. 3) If the days were actually long "ages", then we have the wrong chronological order of events. For instance, plants were created on day three, but insects were not created until day five or six. But many plants depend on insects for cross-pollination, etc. How did plants survive for long "ages" without their needed counterparts in the insect world? Other similar problems of chronological order exist that strongly argue against the day/age theory.

We know that this day/age theory is commonly held by many who teach the false doctrine of theistic evolution. It is not true, and is actually an unnecessary attempt to compromise the truths taught in the Bible with the unproven claims of some scientists. They teach that we live in an ancient universe, while in actuality we live in a relatively young universe that was created in six literal days by our omnipotent God.

Titles For Preachers?

Concerning the scribes and Pharisees, Jesus said: "5. But all their works they do for to be seen of men: they make broad their phylacteries, and enlarge the borders of their garments, 6. Neither be ye called masters: for one is your Master, even Christ." (Matthew 23:5-10). The scribes and Pharisees loved to wear titles of distinction and honor, much like men today. The reason they (the scribes and Pharisees) desired these titles was because they were sorely lacking in humility. Jesus continued: "11. But he that is greatest among you shall be your servant. 12. And whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted." (vss 11,12) In view of these verses we may conclude that those today in the religious world who love to wear titles of honor and distinction are also lacking in humility.

In our day and time there are those who pride themselves in being called "Doctor". Some preachers are shamefully advertised as "Dr.----- of the Church of Christ". In the academic world they may be doctors or professors, but as preachers of the New Testament, they are not! Such is comparable to one in the first

century desiring to wear the title of "Rabbi," and falls under the same condemnation. The wearing of titles in the religious world is utterly foreign to the spirit of Christ and is a clear violation of the principle discussed in **Matthew 23:1-12.**

Preachers of the Gospel must ever keep in mind that our purpose in preaching is not to call attention to ourselves, but to Christ Jesus the Lord. We are just fortunate to be His servants (2 Corinthians 4:5). It is said of John the Baptist that when the people heard him, they followed Jesus (John 1:36-37). This must be the aim/purpose of every preacher- to get the people to follow Jesus and not self!
