# THE LAST DAYS

When you hear the last days discussed it usually is placed in the context of eschatology. Rarely do people speak of the last days in its perspective of the Messianic Age.

While it is noble to maintain awareness of the impending judgment of God (Acts 17:31), we are remiss if this is our only understanding of the last days.

Joel promises God *will pour out my Spirit on all mankind*, indicating dreams, visions and great demonstrations of the power of God will take place by the hands of His chosen vessels. He said in those days, *whosoever calls on the name of the Lord will be delivered* (Joel 2:28-32). Peter says in Acts 2:16ff, that what occurred on that day of Pentecost was that of which Joel spoke. In his quotation he identifies it as the last days. He repeats the phrase, *and it shall be that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved*" (vs 21).

Isaiah then prophesies, **Isa. 2:2** Now it will come about that In the last days The mountain of the house of the LORD Will be established as the chief of the mountains, And will be raised above the hills; And all the nations will stream to it. 3 And many peoples will come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, To the house of the God of Jacob; That He may teach us concerning His ways And that we may walk in His paths." For the law will go forth from Zion And the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. 4 And He will judge between the nations, And will render decisions for many peoples; And they will hammer their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not lift up sword against nation, And never again will they learn war.

When Daniel was called to interpret the dream of Nebuchadnezzar in **Chapter 2** of that book, he said his interpretation was concerning things that would happen in the latter days. He then identified four kingdoms that would exist in succession of each other with the last one being the Roman Empire. He then said of .....the days of those kings (the Roman Empire) the God of heaven will set up a kingdom which will never be destroyed, and that kingdom will not be left for another people; it will crush and put an end to all these kingdoms but ti will itself endure forever (**Dan. 2:44**). There is no question the *last days* will end with the judgment of God being pronounced on everyone who has lived on this earth. However, more importantly, the message is conveyed by both the prophets and New Testament apostles that the *last days* are the days of the kingdom God has promised over which His Son shall reign (**Dan. 7:13,14; Eph. 1:22,23).** This is the kingdom that offers the security of deliverance or salvation to those who call on His name.

The *last days* are comprised so far of at least 2000 years where man is being provided the opportunity to *call on the name of the Lord*. Calling on the name of the Lord is described in Scripture as those who hear the gospel preached and believe what it says and then obey the precepts it sets forth (**Rom. 10:13-15; Acts 22:16**).

Peter tells the scoffers in **2 Pet. 3:7-10**, they can be assured God will come in judgment again, as he did in the days of Noah. He warns them and us that God's word is on the line. He has reserved a time when ungodly men will be judged and punished with eternal fire. He then balances the story by telling us God is willing to allow time for repentance. He then cites two very important factors concerning God's judgment. First, it will be a surprise to all. He will come as a thief in the night. Jesus said as much Himself, **Matt. 24:36** *"But of that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but the Father alone.* Second, he promises the day will definitely come as God never fails to keep His promises (**2 Pet. 3:10; Heb. 6:18-20).** 

Armed with this information we must view the *last days* as an opportunity to those who live faithfully now and a blessing for those who lived faithfully before the kingdom was established on that day of Pentecost in **Acts 2.** The deliverer of all men has come. He has shed His blood to provide atonement and its subsequent justification for all men of all time (**Rom. 3:24-26; Heb. 9:15).** We need to use such an opportunity to prepare to inhabit those mansions Jesus promised in heaven. **John 14:1** *"Do not let your heart be troubled; believe in God, believe also in Me. 2 "In My Father's house are many dwelling places; if it were not so, I would have told you; for I go to prepare a place for you.3 "If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also.* 

## Garfield's Rules & Successful Living by A. T. Pate

One of the most illustrious careers found in the pages of American history is that of James Abram Garfield, twentieth President of the United States. Before his election to this country's highest office, he was a college president, state senator, major- general, U.S. Congressman and U.S. Senator, a combination of honors without parallel in the national annals. When Garfield was a young man, someone placed in his hand one day a slip of paper, which he carried with him all his life. Inscribed on this paper were the following lines:

- ✓ Make few promises.
- ✓ Always speak the truth.
- ✓ Live within your income.
- ✓ Never speak evil of anyone.
- ✓ Keep good company or none.
- ✓ Never play games of chance.
- ✓ Drink no intoxicating drinks.
- ✓ Good character is above everything else.
- ✓ Keep your own secrets if you have any.
- ✓ Never borrow if you can possibly avoid it.
- ✓ Do not marry until you are able to support a wife.
- ✓ Keep yourself honest if you would be happy.
- ✓ When you speak to a person, look into his eyes.
- ✓ Make not haste to be rich, if you would prosper.
- ✓ Save when you are young to spend when you are old.
- ✓ Never run into debt, unless you see a way out again.
- ✓ Good company and good conversation are the sinews of virtues.

✓ Your character cannot be badly hurt except by your own vices.

✓ If anybody speaks evil of you, let your life be so that no one will believe it.

✓ Never be idle. If your hands cannot be employed usefully, attend to the culture of your mind.

As one thinks of this great and successful man, it is well to remember that he was devotedly religious. From his mother Garfield learned the value of prayer and daily Bible reading. It was his practice through life to pause each evening at sunset and read the Scriptures. Because of his belief in prayer, he was often referred to as the "praying colonel" during his army career. Moreover, he always faithfully met with the church for worship. Garfield firmly believed that "there is nothing that can make youth so shapeful, manhood so strong, and old age so beautiful, as the religion of Jesus Christ."

While yet a teenager, he espoused the cause of Christ and took his stand with those calling for a complete return to the New Testament. A few months after preaching his first sermon, Garfield wrote to a friend: "I tell you, my dear brother, the cause in which we are engaged must take the world. It fills my soul when I reflect upon the light, joy and love of the ancient

#### gospel."

Christ and his gospel can give real meaning and purpose to your life! Without Him, no life can be truly successful. Open your heart to him today; for says He: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to him, and

*will sup with him, and he with Me"* (**Revelation 3:20**). "Garfield had attended church more to please his mother than to worship God, but in his late teens underwent a religious awakening, and attended many camp meetings, at one of which he was born again. The next day, March 4, 1850, he was baptized into the Disciples by being submerged in the icy waters of the

We need preaching that is bold and aggressive. Peter prayed that God would grant them the courage to speak *"with all boldness"* (Acts 4:29). Paul and Barnabas found it necessary to speak boldly to the Jews in Antioch of Pisidia (Acts 13:46). Today preachers need to boldly and aggressively declare God's word to men.

We need preaching that is unmistakably clear and intelligible. When Paul preached he *"reasoned"* and *"proved"* his points (Acts 17:2; 18:4). Generalizing and speaking in sixteen syllable words was unheard in Bible times. Some folks won't like it, but preachers need to be clearly understood in this modern era also.

We need preaching that is controversial, meeting error face to face. In the early days, there was a great deal of disputing and debating **(Acts 6:9; 9:28; 17:17).** Some today would have liked New Testament preaching a little bit! The modern cry is: "Don't call names; don't condemn; just preach constructive lessons." The problem is that many weaklings are afraid to defend the Truth and are worried about the loss of friendships and popularity.

We need preaching that is motivated by love for truth and for the lost souls of men and women (2 **Thessalonians 2:10-11**). If we are really concerned about the lost we will cease to "softpeddle" the gospel, but will truly "tell it like it is."

The world needs preaching and the church needs preaching, but not the kind some want. Yet, if all preachers would follow the apostolic examples, then everyone will get the kind of preaching that is sorely needed.

His purpose was to see that the materials he built into the temple were "gold, silver, precious stone" rather than "wood,hay,and straw" (3:12).

No, the Lord's church is not for everybody - just for those who have those qualities which set them apart as God's elect and chosen ones.
