GIVE ME THE FAITH OF ABRAHAM

There are those who believe our faith is granted to us by the direct operation of the Holy Spirit and therefore, can never be lost.

Of course, the Bible does not speak of such. We are told, "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ." (Romans 10:17) That we gain faith by hearing Christ does tell us the Holy Spirit is essential to our faith since He is the One through Whom Christ sent the gospel that produces faith (John 16:13,14).

Today let us focus on two major aspects man should understand concerning faith. As we have already noted, it is our response to the gospel that brings about our faith. We learn from the life of Christ and the remainder of His revelation that He is Immanuel, that is God with us (Mat. 1:23). Learning He died for our sins we soon learn that our redemption from sin rests in our access to the saving power of His blood (1 Cor.15: 3; 1 John 4:10; 1 Pet. 1:18,19).

We are further convinced by observing His life on earth and the power He demonstrated as recorded in the words of the apostle John. "Therefore many other signs Jesus also performed in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these have been written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name." (John 20:30–31)

One of the best examples of faith is Abraham. We learn of his faith when he willingly goes to a land God will show him. Picking up and moving his immediate family away from the remainder of his family was a much bigger deal that we might conclude. He moved away from loved ones but subsequent to moving, accepted a complete change in his faith and worship. No longer was he to worship idols as his father had, but was to serve the living God.

As he served that God he became subject to the commands God gave. He did not choose which ones to obey because he had faith in God to such an extent it was, reckoned to him as righteousness (Gen. 15:6). As we indicated, his faith was known by his obedience to

God's commands. He did not have a faith that allowed him to rest, but one that led him to act as God required. The best example is the story in **Gen. 22** where God told him to offer his only son Isaac as a sacrifice to the Lord. This was the son through whom the world was to be blessed. Yet Abraham's faith told him if God took Isaac He could just as easily bring him back again **(Heb. 11:19).**

It is this story to which James refers in his epistle as an illustration of the necessary faith one must have to be pleasing to God. "Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered up Isaac his son on the altar? You see that faith was working with his works, and as a result of the works, faith was perfected; and the Scripture was fulfilled which says, "AND ABRAHAM BELIEVED GOD, AND IT WAS RECKONED TO HIM AS RIGHTEOUSNESS," and he was called the friend of God. You see that a man is justified by works and not by faith alone." (Jas. 2:21–24) James refers to works that are the obedience the Hebrew writer says is necessary to be granted salvation by Christ (Heb. 5:8,9).

Finally, note the evidence we can, if we become disobedient, lose this faith, "You have been severed from Christ, you who are seeking to be justified by law; you have fallen from grace." (Gal. 5:4)

As for me, please let me gain and practice the faith of Abraham, who obeyed God regardless of his personal preferences.

Their Loss of Life Has Meaning

I know that most, if not all of us, heard about the recent tornados that went through Tennessee last Monday night. Some of you might not be aware of the fact that there was a young family who are members of the Lord's church that were affected by the tornados (Amber, Josh & Sawyer Kimberlin). Sadly, all three lost their lives. How do we make sense of this?

The reality is, a terrible accident happened due to a weather related event. Is there more to it than that?

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There must be, else it makes the lives that were lost so meaningless. Actually it is the opposite. Being Christians, it was their duty, like all of us, to be mindful of the meaning of life, that being, fear God and keep His commandments (Eccl. 12:13). The reason this couple was committed to following the Lord was because they knew they possessed something greater than anything in this world, their soul (Matt. 16:26).

Life after death is real and especially God's children are very much aware of this. That's what makes the lives of this couple so meaningful. Because their lives had meaning, it's a great lesson for all of us. Just like we are told that Abel's life still speaks even though he died (Heb. 11:4), we are all today, listening to the lesson being taught to us by this family. Our prayers are with their families at this time.

In teaching about prayer, Jesus taught to avoid using "meaningless repetitions." He explained that using "many words" does not mean that God is going to hear us any better (Matthew 6:7).

Jesus went on to explain one reason why repeating the same words over and over is meaningless: "Your Father knows what you need before you ask Him" (Matthew 6:8).

We do not pray for God's benefit. God does not need for us to pray so that we might inform Him of what we need. He already knows. So why did Jesus go on to give an example of a prayer and include in it a request for things we need – "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11)?

One of the benefits of prayer, as God designed it, is that by praying for certain things we are reminded of our reliance upon God. God knows we need to eat to survive. Yet Jesus told us to pray for our daily bread anyway. We also know that we must work in order to have the daily bread that we need (2 Thessalonians 3:10). But God is the one who has made it possible for us to do this. By His providence, He has provided in His creation an environment where we can work and receive the daily provisions we need.

All things that are possible are possible because of God – whether we are talking about obtaining what we need to live, health being restored to those who are sick, forgiveness for our sins, etc. When we pray, we cannot help but recognize our reliance upon God. The Book Divine

The Bible is the "word of truth" (2 Timothy 3:15). It is "Scripture breathed out by God" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). Consider these facts about the Bible.

Consisting of sixty six books, it has two major divisions, the Old and the New Testaments. The Old Testament is divided into Law (five books, from Genesis to Deuteronomy), History (Joshua to Esther), Poetry (Job to Song of Solomon) Major Prophets (Isaiah to Ezekiel) and Minor Prophets (Daniel to Malachi).

The New Testament is divided into History (Matthew to Acts), Doctrine (Romans to Jude) and Apocalypse (Revelation).

The Bible is the history of man, and God's dealing with him, in three parts. The first part is characterized as the Patriarchal age; in this period God reveals His will by speaking directly to the fathers. This age or dispensation remains in effect when the second age, the Mosaic dispensation, is brought in. The Mosaic age, with its beginning at Mount Sinai, was especially and exclusively for the children of Israel. When Jehovah spoke to Moses regarding the Sabbath, He said: "Six days shall work be done, but the seventh day is a Sabbath of solemn rest, holy to the Lord. Whoever does any work on the Sabbath day shall be put to death. Therefore the people of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, observing the Sabbath throughout their generations as a covenant forever. It is a sign forever between me and the people of Israel that in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested and was refreshed" (Exodus 31:15-17).

Who shall keep the Sabbath? "the people of Israel."

No Gentile has ever been obligated to keep the Sabbath; because God said that it is a sign forever "between me and the people of Israel." The Law of Moses was the second age or dispensation of Jehovah's dealing with man.

Then, on the day of Pentecost following the resurrection of Jesus, the third, the **Christian** dispensation, had its beginning. As it began, the earlier dispensations were ended. God forgave us "all our trespasses by canceling the record of debt that stood against us with its legal demands. This he set aside, nailing it to the cross" (Colossians 2:13-14).

It is fundamental to our correct understanding of the Bible's message that we appreciate that the law of Moses was taken out of the way, "nailing it to the cross."

Some appeal to the Old Testament for authority. They demand Sabbath observation, because it was required of those living in those days. They appeal to Psalms to justify introducing mechanical instruments of music to Christians and the church today. In **Deuteronomy** 18:15-19 Moses made a statement quoted by Peter in **Acts 3:22-23**, "The Lord God will raise up for you a prophet like me from your brothers. You shall listen to him in whatever he tells you. And it shall be, that every

soul who does not listen to that prophet shall be destroyed from the people" (Acts 3:22-23).

The law of Moses is not binding on anyone today. It has been taken out of the way, "nailing it to the cross" (Colossians 2:13-14). The apostle Paul wrote that Christ "is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility by abolishing the law of commandments expressed in ordinances" (Ephesians 2:14-15).

"Take Care Of ME!"

It doesn't take long for the parents of newborn babies to realize that those "little bundles of joy" also happen to be the most selfish and demanding creatures imaginable! They want to fed on demand. They expect to diapered promptly. They want to sleep without interruptions, and they require immediate attention as soon as they awaken. All of this would be very disturbing in an older person, but we know this is completely natural conduct for newborns.

We anticipate that in time the newborn will begin to lose some of that self-centeredness. They will start to realize that the needs and desires of others must be taken into consideration. We call this process "maturing". Often this "growing up" process demands appropriate action on the part of parents. Frequently this required action is in the form of discipline - the kind that is administered to the seat of the pants! The child has finally "matured" when he is able to think of others before self, when he is no longer the absolutely self-centered being he was at birth.

Spiritually speaking, we were "born again" when we were baptized into Christ (1 Pet. 1:23). At that point we were all "babes" (1 Pet. 2:2). As "babes" we were typically very self-centered. Our own needs, wants, whims, and desires were foremost in our thinking. But God expects us to mature (Heb. 5:12-14). As we "grow up" we should begin to lose our selfish way of thinking and demonstrate the signs of our spiritual maturity. Paul said it this way: "Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others. Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus. . ." (Phil. 2:4,5). If this never happens, there is something seriously wrong.

Christian, are you still selfish and self-centered? Are you still primarily concerned about what others are doing - or not doing - for you? Have you not matured spiritually? Do you need to "grow up"? Think!
