## **HOW'S MY JUDGMENT?**

Judgment is defined as; the ability to make considered decisions or come to sensible conclusions. Following are synonyms listed for judgment: discernment, acumen, shrewdness or common sense.

While I do not wish to set myself up as the example here and dismiss others as inferior in this matter, I do wish for each of us to take a minute or two and consider whether we are using good judgment or not.

One of the things I always appreciated about my father was his ability to suppress his immediate emotional response to a given situation and therefore practice discernment, acumen and common sense. One of the things our parents tried to teach us was to use "good judgment".

This meant in all areas of life. Many times it had to do with the selection of friendships. Will you be led into places to do things that would be wrong by the friends you select was a common question parents seem to ask. What they hoped to teach us was to desire good and not evil and therefore to learn to recognize the signs of good and evil and to choose good with the understanding it is better in the long run. Now that is a truism whether speaking of earthly or spiritual matters.

Next they tried to teach us to look for wisdom from the citizens of our community whose lives indicated they had made wise choices. A broad and imperfect comparison, but one that will illustrate is to consider the school superintendent as wiser than the town drunk. One presumes he has risen to his respected position by making good choices in his career compared to the man who relies upon strong drink to help him forget all the bad choices he has made.

Judgment is like many other things, it requires practice. All of us have learned some things the hard way. That is, we made the wrong choice and suffered

the consequences. So, we learned to listen to Mom and Dad and we began to learn from others who made good choices and our lives have benefitted from making the right choices.

The choices we make in earthly matters affect our immediate life, but those we make in spiritual matters affect us for eternity. That is why the Hebrew writer was alarmed at those who had not learned how to make good decisions in spiritual matters. In **Heb. 5:12-14** he makes the following points:

These brethren had not grown from levels of immaturity to maturity and needed spiritual milk instead of meat.

They were infants spiritually and not accustomed to the word of righteousness.

The result was their senses were not trained to discern good and evil.

Because these brethren had not grown by feeding themselves spiritually by a study of the word of righteousness they were incompetent when it came to discerning good from evil.

The obvious implication of this text is that the word of righteousness comes from the Righteous One. We go to the source to learn good from evil. The source of good is He Who is righteous. He has revealed His righteousness to us in His Word as men were guided by the Holy Spirit He sent to them.

Brethren, this is basic. We are so proud of young people who make sound career decisions and yet those are the LEAST important. How are we preparing them to make the MOST important decisions in life? The choices between good and evil. Drawing near to God to have Him near them. Submitting to God and resisting the devil to see him flee from them.

Is my judgment good? My soul depends upon it!

#### **CHRIST THE DIVIDER**

"I have come to cast fire upon the earth; and how I wish it were already kindled! But I have a baptism to undergo, and how distressed I am until it is accomplished! Do you suppose that I came to grant peace on earth? I tell you, no, but rather division; for from now on five members in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three. They will be divided, father against son and son against father, mother against daughter and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughter-in-law and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law" (Luke 12:49-53 NASV).

It is impossible to remain neutral about Jesus—about who He is and what He demands of all who decide to follow Him. Jesus is not simply one way among many; He is **the** Way, **the** Truth, and **the** Life **(John 14:6)**. His way is narrow and hard. His way places His followers in opposition to those who find His call to be difficult and repulsive. If you decide to follow Jesus you might encounter alienation, turmoil, and even hatred. Sadly, you might find your own family turning from you and your newfound faith. Yet, we shouldn't be surprised; Jesus came to bring division.

Luke refers to Jesus' "mission statement" with the words "I have come to ...." Jesus came to do many things. For example, He came to bring the fire of judgment, a recurring theme in Luke's gospel. "Indeed, the axe is already laid at the root of the trees; so, every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire" (3:9). Judgment had already begun. Jesus' baptism points to His own death on the cross. He is distressed about the cross; it was for this purpose that He came into the world. He was ready to accomplish the Father's will that would bring salvation to all mankind. Jesus was rejected and persecuted; He was accursed by hanging on a tree (Acts 5:30). In dying, Jesus bore the judgment of sin for the world.

Anyone who decided to follow Jesus to the cross, needed to know that they could be opposed by their loved ones. This was serious, especially in a culture of family relationships, clans, ancestries, and social ties. No one wanted to be separated from their family. In fact, first century families were extended families; lots of relatives lived together because of hard economic necessity. Jesus said this would happen; don't be surprised; this goes with the territory of following Him. "For son treats father contemptuously, daughter rises up against her mother, daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; A man's enemies are the men of his own household" (Micah 7:6). Who is in the household of

Jesus? Those who do His will.

Jesus said to "read" the signs of the times (Luke 12:54). His challenge, even now, is to discern correctly, evaluate honestly, and probe deeply concerning the kingdom—a kingdom that is not of this world. Count the cost before you jump in headfirst. How many do not count the cost? How many were infused with initial fervor, only to soon let the fire go out? Remember that our own culture increasingly challenges the very notion of absolute truth, a standard of morality that applies to all, and resists the temerity of saying that someone is wrong. Take a stand for truth and for Jesus and you will be divided from most. Your loved ones may be standing against you. True peace is possible; but it comes with a price. Are we willing to pay that price? Jesus was.

# "THE INCREASE OF THE VINEYARD WILL BECOME DEFILED"!

Moses instructed the physical descendants of Abraham in **Deuteronomy 22:9**, "You shall not sow your vineyard with two kinds of seed..."
The reason?

"...or all the produce of the seed which you have sown and the increase of the vineyard will become defiled."

Abraham's spiritual descendants (Romans 9:7-8), are those who have been born anew (John 3:3, 5); they make up Christ's church (Galatians 3:26-27). Spiritual Israel was given the same advice as physical Israel in regard to sowing two kinds of seed. There is truth and there is error. If both are sown (mixed together), the increase of the vineyard will become defiled. The seed is the word of God (Luke 8:11). If it is mixed with "doctrines and commandments of men" (Matthew 15:8-9), the increase of the vineyard will become defiled. This points to teaching. There is truth from God (scripture); and then there are "interpretations" of what God "meant" by what HE said in HIS word (scripture).

If ONLY God's word had been taught as declared by Jesus to His apostles, there would be only the church that Jesus built, in existence (Matthew 16:18). All would be members of THAT church; we would all be preached the same thing on the subject of "WHAT MUST I DO TO BE SAVED". We would all be called by the same name ~ Christians, for only the church that is OF Christ would exist. Our worship would be alike; we would (and could) support one another in evangelistic efforts; in benevolence, and in edification for we would

all be walking "by the same rule" (Philippians 3:16).

This is the unity for which Jesus prayed among all who believe in Him. Please read **John 17:20-21**. Is this possible, you ask? Well it DID exist initially...for early Christians "continued stedfastly" in the same doctrine...the doctrine taught by the apostles (**Acts 2:42**) What happened? #### If I've Told You Once...

We've heard this line before: "If I've told you once I've told you a thousand times!" We hear it from parents, teachers, friends, and of course, preachers. Repetition is part of teaching. Peter the Apostle knew that. He says in **2 Peter 1 12-15** and again in **3:1** that he was going to remind them of things he knew they already knew so they wouldn't forget them. See also **Jude 5**. With this in mind let's return to the subject of obedience.

We hear many denominational preachers say frequently, "Faith is the important thing! All you've got to do is have faith!" They then get irritated when faithful and good men (in many churches) point out that the Holy Spirit, the same Spirit who inspired the book of Romans, said over in James 2:24, "You see that a man is justified by works and not by faith alone." The inspired author of Hebrews wrote also, "And with whom was He angry for forty years? Was it not with those who sinned, whose bodies fell in the wilderness? And to whom did He swear that they would not enter His rest, but to those who were disobedient? So we see that they were not able to enter because of unbelief." (Hebrews 3:17-19) In saying this he (the Holy Spirit) essentially equated unbelief and disobedience. Thus He also equated belief and obedience! That pretty much seals the deal, doesn't it, concerning the question of whether or not obedience is necessary to become and remain a faithful Christian? I mean, seriously, what more would God have to say that He hasn't said in order to get across the necessity of obedience?

Now, obviously, the Holy Spirit did not think that obedience added ANYTHING to the sacrifice of Christ, did He?
