# Our Current Distress

Americans value freedom. In many ways our freedoms are a blessing and we have benefited by them. Scripture endorses the value of freedom. Paul encouraged slaves who could be free to take advantage of that opportunity (1 Corinthians 7:21). Peter said to "act as free men", but then added not to "use your freedom as a covering for evil, but use it as bondslaves of God" (1 Peter 2:16). "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty" (2 Corinthians 3:17). Jesus frees us from sin, death, the law, addictions.

Our freedom is limited. We are servants of God. As servants, we submit to Him. When there is a conflict, we submit to God over man (Acts 5:29). The fact that we serve God makes us very different, like aliens from another planet, and this causes us to be slandered (1 Peter 2:11-12). The focus of this post is 1 Peter 2:12: "Keep your behavior excellent among the Gentiles, so that in the thing in which they slander you as evildoers, they may because of your good deeds, as they observe them, glorify God in the day of visitation." What does Peter mean by excellent behavior that will cause the non-Christians to end up glorifying God? Consider 1 Peter 2:13-3:12. He tells us to "submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human institution" (1 Peter 2:13). He subdivides that ... submission to kings and governors; servants to masters, even the ornery ones; wives to husbands, even the unbelieving ones. He sums up: "All of you be harmonious, sympathetic, brotherly, kind-hearted and humble in spirit; not returning evil for evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead" (1 Peter 3:8-9). Imagine the challenge of a Christian slave submitting to an unreasonable master, or a Christian wife to a pagan husband. But remember, Jesus Himself submitted to flagrant injustice (1 Peter 2:21-25).

Our submission to the authorities glorifies God. What does the world see in us? Stubbornness when it comes to matters of faith, honesty, integrity, boldness to speak the Word. But we are model citizens, model employees, model spouses in all other ways. We do not insist on our rights. We submit. So they realize that in the areas where we cannot submit, it is because of our commitment to obey God. But aside from this, we are meekly compliant.

Freedom is intoxicating. It grates on us to surrender freedom we think we have the right to. But we possess no inalienable rights in this situation. We are servants of Christ: "Whoever forces you to go one mile, go with him two" (Matthew 5:41). I remember when the seatbelt law came into effect. I didn't like it, and I wasn't alone in that. I chose not to wear a seatbelt until required by law. That wasn't too smart, I understand, but I am illogically rebellious at times. When the government required it, I began to wear it for conscience sake. I was raised to respect authority, and I believe that God wants me to.

Some have balked at wearing masks at government mandate. We are to obey what the governor says whether we think he has the right to say it or not. We are to obey whether we like it or not, think it wise or not. If the government doesn't mandate masks in our assemblies but the church leaders do, we should submit, because God asks us to submit to them, too (Hebrews 13:17). Or if my wearing a mask will simply enable my brother to feel more comfortable in worship, I should submit (1 Peter 5:5; Galatians 5:13). (emp. mine Jcs.)

So we don't submit to anything that is against God's Word. For example, we assemble to worship regardless of governmental decree. But we do submit to anything that does not lead us to violate Scripture, even if we

detest it. For example, wearing masks. What a testimony to the world when we show that we will risk life and limb to obey God. But we will readily give up "our rights" to submit to governmental decrees or societal norms (1 Corinthians 9:19-23) that do not make us disobey the Lord.

May God give us more humility.

## **Commentary on Our Distress**

First, I confess I harvested the article by bro. Fisher from Facebook and it had no title. I have assigned it a title to try to guide the reader's mind to the subject under consideration.

It could be stated accurately Gary's article is more about appropriate behavior of the Lord's disciples than the actual subject of our response to Covid-19 governmental guidelines.

The fact is our response to governmental guidelines is crucial to our faithful adherence to the attitude Jesus demands of us as we walk in His steps (1 Pet. 2:21-24).

What seems to be missing among a few brethren is what Jesus actually stood for as He set the example for our lives. Jesus resisted Satan and his advances, not the Roman government specifically. That, brethren, needs to be the center of our thoughts on this subject and any other. What can a man do that is more irreverent than slapping the Son of God in the face, literally? Yet Jesus' concern was greater for the hearts of the Jews who were crying crucify Him than over how He was being mistreated by pagan men responding to their evil leaders.

There are two major concerns I have about the current issues we face and neither of them involve wearing a mask at the insistence of either governmental leaders or leaders in the church. First we must answer for ourselves when **Acts 5:29** comes into play relative to our actions. Peter and John were being ordered to desist preaching Jesus, which is exactly what the Lord expects of each one of us. This provides for us a clear violation of God's commands by the local authorities. When that occurs we must take a similar stand.

Where we make our greatest mistake is thinking a violation of our rights as a citizen of the United States of America is equal to a violation of our rights as a citizen in the Kingdom of God. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Please read the biblical support bro. Fisher gives us for clarification of this point.

Let us all be certain of our position on this subject. When the government decides we cannot comply with the commands of Scripture, we will stand our ground. When they pass or enact laws that deny our ability to do those things God has taught us in order to sustain our faith, we will stand our ground. But telling us to wear masks does not do that. It may be your opinion that singing is somehow diminished as an act of worship if you have a mask, but that is just that, your opinion. The ability to make melody in our hearts can be as readily accomplished with or without a mask. Now, do the voices sound as good to the human ear? Of course not, but that is not how God measures our worship and we all know that. Otherwise the brother who cannot carry a tune would not be allowed to sing and make melody in his heart to the Lord. No, what is being affected is your personal right and privilege that you have enjoyed for your lifetime.

The Lord has much greater concern for your continued faithful worship and service than He does for what the government does to you. "Do not fear what you are about to suffer. Behold, the devil is about to cast some of you into prison, so that you will be tested, and you will have tribulation for ten days. Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life." (Revelation 2:10)

#### **ZACCHEUS**

"He entered Jericho and was passing through. And there was a man called by the name of Zaccheus; he was a chief tax collector and he was rich. Zaccheus was trying to see who Jesus was, and was unable because of the crowd, for he was small in stature. So, he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree in order to see Him, for He was about to pass through that way. When Jesus came to the place, He looked up and said to him, Zaccheus, hurry and come down, for today I must stay at your house. And he hurried and came down and received Him gladly. When they saw it, they all began to grumble, saying. He has gone to be the guest of a man who is a sinner. Zaccheus stopped and said to the Lord, Behold, Lord, half of my possessions I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will give back four times as much. And Jesus said to him, Today, salvation has come to this house, because he, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost." (Luke 19:1-10 NASV).

Jesus said it was hard for rich people to enter into the kingdom (Luke 18:24). Yet, we can be thankful that God can, and does, bring wealthy people into the kingdom. Zaccheus was an unlikely candidate for the kingdom from many standpoints; he was wealthy, he worked for the Roman government; he even had doubts about his past life. Now, Jesus goes home with him. The borders of the kingdom are broad.

Zaccheus was interested in seeing Jesus; he climbed a tree to get a closer look. Jesus took the initiative, telling Zaccheus to get down and then they would go home together. This wasn't the first time Jesus ate with tax collectors (Luke 5:27). "I must" stay at your house. It was a *necessity* for Jesus to go home with Zaccheus. And why wouldn't Jesus do that? He came to seek and save the lost; even wealthy tax collectors were not beyond the pale of heaven's concern. Zaccheus' neighbors didn't like what was happening; to them, he was a sinner. Zaccheus realized the possibility that maybe he needed to right any wrongs committed in his tax work. He would give half of his goods (wealth) to the poor. He would repay to the max anyone he had defrauded. The Law of Moses said to add 20% for restitution (Leviticus 5:16). Zaccheus goes beyond that amount. True repentance flows from a changed heart; it also shows itself in concrete actions.

Implicit in this episode is the need to have faith in Jesus Christ. What and how much did Zaccheus know about Jesus? Early in **Luke (3:8)**, John the Baptist told those who would come to Jesus that they must show the fruits of repentance. Isn't that what Zaccheus was doing? Isn't he acting with faith in Jesus? Jesus said: *Today*, *salvation*, *has come to this house*. If Zaccheus was a son of Abraham, then he was a person of faith. It is wonderful that salvation came to Zaccheus and his house; in fact, salvation was coming to all those who lived in Jericho. Even more, it is wonderful that salvation comes to your house and to my house. But do we really want Jesus to come home with us? Will we take the riches out of our lives so we can climb a tree to see Jesus?


