"Now I exhort you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all agree and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be made complete in the same mind and in the same judgment." (1 Corinthians 1:10)

The question for us as children of God, those who have assayed to join ourselves to a local congregation of saints, is how do we reach this point? Some answers are found in the following passage from the same inspired writer, "Therefore I, the prisoner of the Lord, implore you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling with which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, showing tolerance for one another in love, being diligent to preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (Ephesians 4:1–3)

The first step is to walk worthy of our calling. When Paul spoke to those at Thessalonica about their calling, he said they were called by the gospel, that you may gain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. In the prior verse he defines their calling as being, for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and faith in the truth. (2 Thess. 2:13,14) This says we are to walk then as Jesus did (1 Pet. 2:21ff) caring for the things He cared for. We are certainly aware that Christ so loved the church that He gave Himself up for it. He was willing to die for the church. We then must have that same mindset. After all He told us we must sacrifice ourselves to enter the kingdom (Mat. 16:24ff).

Another guideline for our conduct in the church is that we love one another. We will find it very difficult to walk worthy of our calling with such attributes as humility, gentleness, patience and tolerance without genuine love for one another.

We should remember what the apostle told Timothy when he had instructed him in the attributes of leaders in the church. He told him following these guidelines for elders and deacons that this was to show him, how one ought to conduct himself in the

household of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and support of the truth. (1 Tim. 3:14,15)

I have cited these passages as indicators of the attitude each of us should have toward the congregation and each of its members as we serve in His kingdom. God specifically designed the local churches to provide guidance and oversight to each member. He set us the various offices in the church to bring about growth and so the church could build itself up in love (Eph. 4:16). Those offices listed earlier in this chapter are, evangelists, pastors and teachers. All designed to bring about this growth.

A current problem in the churches in our land is when people become disenchanted with the leadership, not for doctrinal error but because their decisions do not match their personal judgment, they simply leave and move to another congregation. This is particularly prevalent in metropolitan areas where there are many choices. This certainly has happened in the Kansas City Metroplex and is happening all over the land in similar fashion.

The Hebrew writer admonishes us all to trust in our leadership. "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they keep watch over your souls as those who will give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with grief, for this would be unprofitable for you." (Hebrews 13:17) Brethren need to hear the message of this verse. It is telling you when you become a problem for the leadership it is not to your profit in the eyes of the Lord. It is a serious matter. There is to be a commitment to the local work. We can use the argument about being members of the church Jesus died for regardless of where we worship but that does not free us from the responsibility to submit to the leaders of the local work.

Each local church in any given community will continue to struggle and find difficulty being as strong as it needs to be if its members waffle in their loyalty to that work.

Be not deceived into altering the facts of the matter and claiming you are leaving over doctrinal issues when it really is all about yourself.

What Is A Conservative? Robert H. West

A few months ago it was my good pleasure to watch a very interesting television program. A well-known "conservative" political figure was being questioned by a panel of college students concerning his views.

One of the first questions asked was to this effect: "What is a conservative?" The gentleman's answer was something like this: "Actually, instead of being called a 'conservative,' I would prefer the word 'conservationist.' We all recognize a conservationist as one who is dedicated to the preservation of the natural beauty, wealth and resources of this great country. A 'conservative' is merely a conservationist in the political realm. He is dedicated to the preservation of the Constitution of these United States and the rights and privileges guaranteed therein. He is firmly opposed to any theory or trend which would, in its ultimate effect, weaken or deprive us of this, our greatest national resource."

As I listened to these eloquent words, it struck me that such remarks have direct application in the religious as well as the political realm. In the brotherhood today we hear frequent use of the terms "conservative" and "liberal." But what is a conservative? Adapting the words of the distinguished television speaker, a conservative is merely a conservationist in the spiritual realm. He is dedicated to the preservation of the gospel of Christ and the doctrine and practices which arise therefrom. He is firmly opposed to any theory or trend which would, in its ultimate effect, weaken or deprive us of this, our greatest and only guide and spiritual resource.

Another student asked the conservative politician, "Is it true that conservatives are opposed to progress?" The speaker answered by pointing out that such was a popular misrepresentation of the conservative position. He affirmed that the conservative view alone afforded the stimulus for real progress — progress within the framework of the Constitution.

So many times we hear the charge from our liberal brethren of how the conservatives cannot make any progress. But such charge is also a popular misrepresentation of the religious conservative position. We affirm without hesitation that by the conservative view alone can any real progress be made which will please our Father — progress within the framework of the Scriptures!

The conservative, then, is one who upholds, defends, and preserves as a spiritual conservationist,

the worship, work, organization and doctrine outlined in the Constitution of the Kingdom of God which we know as the Gospel. He pleads for a return to the "old paths." He calls for a building "according to the pattern" in all things. He strikes out at every human theory and human institution which would compete with the Divine plan. He strives for that progress which, although not "highly esteemed in the eyes of men," is nevertheless the only real progress which matters — progress which honors and glorifies God and His word.

May God help us all to be "conservationists" in the government of our Divine King.

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The Deity of Christ

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through Him, and apart from Him nothing came into being that has come into being. In Him was life, and the life was the Light of men. The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it" (John 1:1-5 NASV).

John chapter one sounds more than vaguely familiar. "In the beginning" takes us back to Genesis chapter one, where life and light, yea, all things, had their *genesis*, their beginning. Genesis looks ahead; John looks backward. "By the word of the Lord the heavens were made, and by the breath of His mouth all their host" (Psalm 33:6). We accept by faith that God spoke and it was so (Hebrews 11:3). In the beginning the Word of God, the logos, created all things. Greek philosophy (500BC) tells us that logos was the shaping, ordering, and directing power of the universe, the captain, pilot, Father, elder son, etc. A point of departure between the *logos* of John's gospel and the *logos* of Greek philosophy is important. Jesus, the Word, was there, in the beginning. He created all things; but He was before all things; His existence is eternal. The Word was in eternal fellowship with the Father, sharing in the Father's essence.

Jesus *is* God in eternity. Moses tells us that God created the heavens and the earth; he doesn't stop to explain where God came from. God was in the beginning; He was always there; He shall always be. Jesus shares in God's eternity; He was in the beginning with God, existing in glory (John 17:5, 24). Throughout the Gospel of John, Jesus tell us that He

and His Father are one. When you see Me, Jesus said, you have seen the Father. The God who chose a special people and then worked His plan through them to save mankind, is the God who was manifested in the flesh (John 1:14). To say that Jesus was "a" god, is to deny His deity, His eternity; it is to rob the world of a Savior.

Jesus was with God from eternity, a relationship that was before the creation. Jesus is divine, eternal, and shares in the characteristics of Deity. Jesus was with God; Jesus was God. Jewish monotheism would recoil from more than one God (Deuteronomy 6:4-6); yet, the Word was God, just as the Father was God; one in essence, but distinct in being (think about Father, Son, and Spirit in the Great Commission). Jesus is one with God. Thomas, after seeing the bruised body of Jesus, said: My Lord and My God!

Everything, from the least to the greatest, came into being through the Word; no exceptions. He who has always been made all things. More, all things were created; there was a time when all things did not exist; all things are not eternal matter, from which the Logos took something and fashioned the universe. He did what only God can do: Create! Life and light, common to John's writing, come from Jesus: physically and spiritually. Jesus is the Light of the world (John 8:12). The light of God's word exposes the darkness of sin and rebellion; the light from Jesus shows the way forward, out of sin and loss, for those who will come to Him. It is not Greek philosophy, or self-defined morality, or a simple lifestyle that saves. Jesus is not simply one side of some supposed, spiritual duality that oppose each other, vying for souls. Jesus is the Word, the Logos, Himself Deity. Jesus saves.
