IS MY WEALTH A TOOL OR AN IDOL?

In our daily Bible reading, Roberta and I came across this text which seems so appropriate to every age of man from the beginning. ""What profit is the idol when its maker has carved it, Or an image, a teacher of falsehood? For its maker trusts in his own handiwork When he fashions speechless idols. "Woe to him who says to a piece of wood, 'Awake!' To a mute stone, 'Arise!' And that is your teacher? Behold, it is overlaid with gold and silver, And there is no breath at all inside it.

"But the LORD is in His holy temple. Let all the earth be silent before Him."" (Habakkuk 2:18-20)

While the current season is manufactured in the hearts of men, it is not without value. Most of us devote our thoughts to others at this time of year. We try to watch ourselves to be especially kind and considerate of our friends. loved ones and even our enemies. In that sense it often serves as clarion call to be exactly what we are called to be as disciples of the Lord (1 Pet. 2:21ff).

This text, however, deals with a different issue with Judah, that we suffer from today as well. It is the subject of idolatry. Now we are quick to deny being idolaters, but let us actually consider our lifestyles and see if there is a tinge of it or even a considerable amount of idolatry in the planning and conduct of our lives here on earth.

Our wealth

There is no denying we are wealthier than any generation of people who have ever inhabited the earth. While a million dollars does not go as far as it once did, there are more millionaires in this world today than ever before. And just so we don't point the finger at others, many brethren have been this successful financially. There is nothing inherently wrong with wealth as we will illustrate later. But it clearly presents temptations that alternative conditions do not (Mat. 6:19-21). It is more challenging to meet the Lord's expectations on laying up treasures in heaven for the wealthy than the poor.

The comfort our wealth brings

Many of the worries and concerns men have here on earth are of a material nature. This is natural since we are fleshly beings located here temporarily. We seek to improve the conditions of our existence and, again there is nothing wrong with that. The issue spiritually is when that takes precedence over living our lives in view of eternity. Thus the admonition of the Lord again (Mat. 6:25-34). This does not preclude one securing a better home or clothing, but it does teach us not to trust in the material things in this life and to be distracted from the greater value in trusting in the Lord first and caring for these things secondarily. When we fail to put the Lord ahead of these material matters we are following the footsteps of those being warned by the prophet Habakkuk. We are not to be taught by wealth, for it teaches falsehood. We cannot communicate with our wealth and receive appropriate instruction from it. And when we try we are failing to listen to the Lord in His holy temple..., and we then are not silent before Him. Much like when Peter was reprimanded by God (Mat. 17:5).

Do we depend upon wealth or use it?

As we continue to pursue the point of wealth becoming an idol, let us try to honestly determine if we depend on our wealth for comfort and security or if we use it to do the good things God has in mind for the wealthy. The well known verse in 1 Tim. 6:10 teaches us the love of money is the root of all evil.... That text is not speaking to wealthy people in particular. It is speaking to those greedy for the benefits of more money than they have. As a result he gives the following admonition to those who are wealthy,

"Instruct those who are rich in this present world not to

be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly supplies us with all things to enjoy. Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is life indeed." (1 Timothy 6:17–19)

The wealthy person can be just as faithful to the Lord without being an idolater as the poor. He may have more obstacles, but trusting in the Lord who blessed him with wealth and using that wealth to serve the Lord's wishes is exactly the reason he has it.

The Son of God

Jesus answered and said to him, ... "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathanael answered Him, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; You are the King of Israel" (John 1:48,49). John's gospel will build faith in Jesus Christ, the Son of God; He alone can provide life to all who will believe (John 20:30-31). These early encounters with Jesus show curiosity; they also show faith—embryonic faith—but faith nonetheless. Consider Nathanael's recognition and declaration about Jesus.

"Rabbi, you are the Son of God; You are the King of Israel." Nathanael is recognizing exactly who Jesus is. The earlier declaration of the same truth by John the Baptist becomes clearer; there was testimony; now there is evidence. Jesus said: "I am indeed the Son of God. I know about you, about your character, about your whereabouts." As Jacob the Supplanter (John 1:51) changed his way of thinking after being in God's presence, Nathanael knows now that something good can come out of Nazareth. Who could act in such a way except Deity? No wonder the disciples believed that they had found the Messiah!

The Son of God is the title used characteristically in John's gospel. The Son's relationship with the Father is unique. God gave His *only begotten* Son for the sins of the world. While there is a sense in which God has many sons, Jesus bears a relationship to the Father that is not shared by anyone else. How could it be otherwise? Jesus was in the bosom of the Father. He and the Father are one. Apart from the Father, Jesus could do nothing. In Jesus' death, we see His love; we also see the love of the Father.

Nathanael also said of Jesus: "You are the King of Israel." Jews would be familiar with kings—their own kings who ruled over Israel—and Roman kings who then dominated the world. Now, there is another king with a different kind of kingdom. Here is Nathanael, an Israelite, who gets the point. Here is Jesus, fulfilling

the hopes and dreams of God's chosen people. Jews could come to Jesus, not as Jews, but as believers (John 1:12). The title *The Son of God* is loaded with Messianic implications. "I will be a father to him and he will be a son to Me; when he commits iniquity, I will correct him with the rod of men and the strokes of the sons of men" (2 Samuel 7:14). "I will declare: The Lord has said to Me, you are My Son, Today I have begotten You" (Psalm 2:7). "I kept looking in the night visions, and behold, with the clouds of heaven One like a Son of Man was coming, And He came up to the Ancient of Days And was presented before Him" (Daniel 7:13). OT background helps us understand the claims Jesus makes. Can we agree with Peter? "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (John 6:69).

John chapter one begins and ends with the Deity of Christ. All need to see Jesus for who He is—the Son of God. This is what Nathanael saw. In fact, he saw far more than he expected to see when he first came to Jesus. He now sees the Son of Man, God in the flesh. Whatever Nathanael might have been doing under the fig tree, he now begins his walk with Jesus.
