LET US NOT BE DECEIVED

"Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of these things the wrath of God comes upon the sons of disobedience. Therefore do not be partakers with them; for you were formerly darkness, but now you are Light in the Lord; walk as children of Light (for the fruit of the Light consists in all goodness and righteousness and truth), trying to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Do not participate in the unfruitful deeds of darkness, but instead even expose them; for it is disgraceful even to speak of the things which are done by them in secret." (Ephesians 5:6–12)

This passage follows an admonition to walk in love as Christ did in giving Himself for us to redeem us from our sin. The next verses that immediately precede these then encourage us to avoid immorality, impurity, greed, covetousness and idolatry. We are told this is the conduct of the sons of disobedience and will incur the wrath of God.

The passage indicates the child of God will fall into this disreputable conduct when he is deceived. The point being, he knows better but if not careful can be tempted to engage in such conduct with those of the world (darkness). We are reminded the darkness he speaks of is the place from which we have come. Being partakers indicates the world initiates these concepts of immorality and encourages us to become partakers.

How do we become partakers and what is the effect on our relationship with God? Second John verse 9 tells us we do so by accepting and encouraging their conduct. This passage differentiates clearly between darkness and light. We know we are to be the light of the world from the teaching of Jesus (Matt. 5:14-16). Our light ceases to shine if we do not distinguish clearly for all to see the difference in walking in love as Christ did and this immoral conduct of the world.

As we all know, the accepted and promoted morality of the world is in sharp contrast to that of our Lord.

Our passage teaches us we are not only to avoid participating in the evil deeds of the world, but we are to expose them.

In this day and age, it is not politically correct to challenge the morality promoted in society. But we must realize politically correctness is not the guideline for being the light of the world. When the world begins to say it is acceptable for man to change the order God has set for us, we must oppose that vigorously. It is not sufficient for us privately hold "our opinion" on such matters, it is imperative that we embrace the morality of God and Christ. Notice these verses in this text; "Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children; and walk in love, just as Christ also loved you and gave Himself up for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God as a fragrant aroma." (Ephesians 5:1-2) If we imitate God and walk in love as Christ did, we will not fear the recriminations of those in the world. We must truly be His disciples.

The way we take our stand is by being converted from the heart to His form of teaching (1 Cor. 6:17). "Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:1–2)

If we are indeed the brethren of the apostle and joint heirs with Christ (Rom. 8:16,17), we must be willing to suffer with Him in order to be glorified with Him.

The differentiation God calls for between His children and the world is clear. But it also brings with it persecution on many different levels. We should be proud to suffer in His name (Acts 5:41; 1 Peter 4:14,16), Who gave us our name, Christian. Let us tell the world in word and deed the message of Christ.

I consider the following message found on Facebook, from Russ Bowman to be of supreme value to all servants in the Kingdom of God. (Editor)

In the bible, the phrase "the day of the LORD" is noted in thirty verses. The concept is first expressed in the OT prophets, where it addresses a day of judgment, of separation, of testing. It consistently exposes those who lack real trust in God and becomes the impetus to their destruction - sometimes physically but always spiritually. But it also serves as a day of deliverance and identification for the faithful remnant (and, again consistently, it is but a remnant who maintain their trust). The specific circumstance may vary - the Assyrian invasion (Isaiah; Amos); the Babylonian captivity (Jeremiah; Ezekiel; Zephaniah); a locust plague (Joel); the introduction of the gospel (Peter); the final judgment (Paul; Peter) - but each event serves to identify and divide the unfaithful from the remnant. And they all prefigure the ultimate eternal separation of the just and unjust by the Lord Himself.

I'm no prophet and only God can reveal what circumstances truly serve as divine efforts at refining mankind. But nothing in my lifetime has so identified and distinguished persons of real faith like the present pandemic. I don't know if COVID is a true "day of the Lord" event, the latest and most effective effort of Satan to undermine real trust and discipleship, or simply the experience of life under the sun. Regardless of which is true, this much is certain - now is the time for people of faith to stand up, be counted, be active, and persevere. God's people are not to cower in fear nor subsist in selfish hypocrisy.

Regardless of the events in the world around us, we are to serve, worship, influence, love, and sacrifice. Our King rules. We either trust Him completely or we don't. Let's start living like people of faith - not pretenders.

Two Men Serve the Lord by Bill Hall

The second man is stable and unwavering. Brethren come and go; the congregation of which he is a part has its periods of depression; problems arise from time to time; but this man's enthusiasm remains constant through it all, for it is centered on Him who never changes, the One who has promised, "I will never leave you nor forsake you."

Let us take heed the, how we build (1 Corinthians 3:10). Perhaps the title of this article should read, *One Man Serves the Lord*, for it is very doubtful that the first man serves the Lord at all.

But He Lingered

As morning dawned, the angels urged Lot, saying, "Up! Take your wife and your two daughters who are here, lest you be swept away in the punishment of the city." But he lingered. So the men seized him and his wife and his two daughters by the hand, the LORD being merciful to him, and they brought him out and set him outside the city (Gen. 19:15-16)

But he lingered--these words were spoken about a man named Lot. Lot was living in the city of Sodom as a result of pitching his tent toward Sodom and the well watered plains of Jordan when he and Abraham parted ways (Gen. 13). Sodom was an exceedingly wicked city (Gen. 13:13) and now God has decided to destroy it (Gen. 18), Two angels who have taken on the appearance of men come to Sodom and tell Lot about the impending destruction, urging him to take his family and flee quickly lest he be destroyed along with the punishment of the city (Gen. 19:12-16). Some very powerful influences are brought to bear on Lot to induce him to leave Sodom. Had it not been for the mercy of God, Lot would have perished with the rest of Sodom.

Why should we wonder and be amazed that Lot lingered in availing himself of the opportunity to be saved? Lot has his counterpart in every place where the true word of God is proclaimed. Men are told of God's

goodness as well as His severity (Rom. 11:22). Men are told what to do to be saved as well as what to do to keep saved as is evidenced throughout the pages of the New Testament. Men are warned to flee the wrath that is to come (2 Thess. 1:7-9). Yet they still linger, procrastinate, put off doing what they know they should do.

There is a record being kept of all the deeds we do in this body, good or bad and one day that record will testify either for us or against us (Rev. 20:12; 2 Cor. 5:10). Oh, how careful we should be each day. What has been recorded on our record thus far? Is it recorded that we have and are now working out our salvation with fear and trembling according to God's word (Phil. 2:12).
