"And ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free" June 5, 2022

WASHED, SANCTIFIED AND JUSTIFIED by Jim Stauffer

"Such were some of you; but you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and in the Spirit of our God." (1 Corinthians 6:11)

What is the connection between sanctification, justification and being washed? It is clear it took all three of these to change the Corinthians from the unrighteous who could not inherit the kingdom of God to those who were acceptable in His sight.

The first thing is being washed. This is a reference to the new birth Jesus taught Nicodemus in **John 3:3-5.** He said we must be born again of the water and the spirit. This is the washing of regeneration Paul speaks of in his letter to **Titus in 3:5.** This new birth corresponds to the new creature Paul tells the Corinthians they have become, **2 Cor. 5:17.** 

Paul then says they were justified. Being justified is the same as being righteous. It means one is now in compliance with the law and previous violations have been removed. In **Romans 3:24-26** we learn justification occurs with the process of redemption. He then says to the Colossians redemption occurs with the forgiveness of sins (**Col. 1:13,4**). And, of course, we learn early on in Acts 2:38, forgiveness of sins results from being baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

When they became justified by the washing of regeneration, God sanctified them. They became holy ones or saints. Their holiness resulted from obedience to Christ and the conference of His righteousness on them as is stated here, *"He made Him who knew no sin to be* 

sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him." (2 Corinthians 5:21) His saints or holy ones we are then set apart for service in His kingdom.

And all this, he says in our text is ...in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and in the Spirit of God. This reminds us Jesus is the author of eternal salvation to all those who obey Him (Heb. 5:8,9).

In summary of the message of **1 Cor. 6:11**, we see the need to be born again of the water and spirit, the washing of regeneration, becoming a new creature by way of baptism for the remission of our sins, the process of our redemption. This allows us to become justified, sanctified for His service as we then enter the kingdom of God. We have been redeemed, Peter tells us by the blood of Jesus Christ, the unblemished Lamb of God (1 Peter 1:18,19).

The Corinthians were outside the kingdom of God, lost in their sin, until they obeyed the commands of the Son of God. The man God has chosen to judge each of us in righteousness according to what we have done in our lives here on earth and by the words He has spoken (Acts 17:31; 2 Corinthians 5:10; John 12:48).

Would you like to be in the kingdom of God? You can be. There are two kingdoms, one is ruled by Satan and the other by Christ, the Son of God. You can be transferred from Satan's kingdom to God's kingdom as the Corinthians were if you will be washed, sanctified and justified as Jesus has authorized.

## But Seek First the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness Keith Sharp I Mountain Home, Arkansas, USA

True Story. Billy was 6 years old. It was springtime close to summer vacation. When school was out, he and his mom, a widow who was remarrying, were moving. He came home from school and informed his mom he wouldn't be going back to baseball. When she asked why, he replied, "The rest of our games are on Wednesday night, and we'll be in church." She hadn't said a word to him about it. She didn't have to. How would that compare to our family practices?

In **Matthew 6:19-34** Jesus contrasts the righteousness of the kingdom with the materialism of the Gentiles. **Matthew 6:33** summarizes this contrast. *"But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you."* What should be our chief goal in life?

The kingdom of God of Old Testament promise and prophecy is the rule of God in the hearts of His people. "Now when He was asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God would come, He answered them and said, 'The kingdom of God does not come with observation; nor will they say, "See here!" or "See there!" For indeed, the kingdom of God is within you"" (Luke 17:20-21).

The kingdom of Christ is the church of Christ in that the people in whose hearts the Lord rules are those who compose His church. The terms "kingdom" and "church" are used interchangeably at least twice in the New Testament (Matthew 16:18-19; Hebrews 12:22-23, 28).

If we *"seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness,"* we put kingdom blessings and kingdom relationships at the absolute top of our priorities.

The context of this summary statement contrasts concern over material wealth with the spiritual blessings and relationships of the kingdom **(Matthew 6:19-34).** If I have a job which involves sinful activities or prevents me from serving the Lord, including assembling to worship with his people, I need to find a different job.

This also applies to family and friends. The Lord and His kingdom even come ahead of family **(Matthew 10:34-38).** If family comes to visit, and it's time for

worship, invite them to come with you. If they won't come, ask them to stay until you return.

It certainly applies to recreation. Are we *"lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God"?* (2 Timothy 3:4) If we miss worship or Bible classes for sports, what does that tell us? Do we have time to go fishing but can't find time to talk to a neighbor about the Bible? If we put kids' sports ahead of the gospel meeting, what are we teaching our children? (Ephesians 6:4)

Brother J.D. Tant was a famous preacher of three or four generations ago. He used to close his articles in "Gospel Advocate" magazine by warning, "Brethren, we're drifting." It didn't make him popular, but he was right. Are we drifting?

# 12 Evidences I Have "Lost My First Love"

"Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love" (Rev. 2:4).

 When my delight in the Lord is no longer as great as my delight in someone else, I have lost my *"first love."* When my soul does not long for times of rich fellowship in God's Word or in prayer, I have lost my *"first love."*

3. When my thoughts during leisure moments do not reflect upon the Lord, I have lost my *"first love."*4. When I claim to be "only human" and easily give in to those things I know displease the Lord, I have lost my *"first love."*

# The first gospel sermon -- all about *EVIDENCE*.

The fundamental requirement of the gospel is faith. One cannot please God without faith (Hebrews 11:6). The first sermon preached that included the offer of complete forgiveness of sins is recorded in Acts 2:14-39. It concludes by giving answer to their question: "What shall we do?" (v.37) That question is the result of their conviction. They believed! The sermon was designed to produce that faith by supplying strong evidence - reasons to believe. What evidence did Peter supply?

- prophecy about the events that were occurring on that day (v.17-21).
- miracles, signs and wonders openly done by Jesus (v. 22).
- the public life of Jesus known to multitudes of people (v. 22).
- the unique and unprecedented death of Jesus, an innocent man (v. 23).
- The Resurrection -- the ultimate proof ... for which there must be further proof (v.24).
- David's prophecy about the resurrection (v. 25-27, 30-31).
- David's body still in the tomb vs. the empty tomb of Jesus (v. 29).
- testimony of many eye witnesses who saw Jesus alive after the crucifixion (v. 32).
- the outpouring of miracles (v.1-12) on this Pentecost in Jerusalem (33).

Peter's conclusion: "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ" (v. 36). Many who heard were "cut to the heart." They believed. Their faith caused them to ask: "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (v. 37).

Faith is not spiritual wishful thinking. Bible faith is a conviction of truth on the basis of incontrovertible evidence.

Do you believe? Then you should be asking: "What shall we do?"
