IS YOUR AUTHORITY AUTHORITATIVE?

One of the very first things we learn in reading the Scriptures is the story of Adam and Eve and how Eve was deceived by Satan (Genesis 3:4-6; 2 Corinthians 11:3). This sin on their part resulted from accepting the word of someone other than God. They took Satan's word when he said God did not mean what He said. In the very beginning we see the need to hear God's word and heed it regardless of what anyone else may say.

Jesus said God's word is the truth (John 17:17). He said He will judge us by His word and that judgment will be according to righteousness (John 12:48; Acts 17:31).

One would think it would be very clear that the judgments of God upon mankind, both during life on the earth and in the final judgment would be based on what He has communicated to us through His Son (Hebrew 1:1,2). Especially in light of the history of the Jews in the Old Testament. Both the Kingdoms of Israel and Judah were punished by the captivity of their enemies because they failed to honor the Law He gave them.

But men in our generation just as in those of the past continue to trust in authority that exists outside the domain of God Himself. Listen to Jesus following His resurrection, "And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth." (Matthew 28:18) The apostle Paul confirms that as he speaks by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit in the letter to the Ephesians. Chapter 1:18-23 states that God demonstrated His great might whenHe raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the nearly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. And He put all things in subjection under His feet, and gave Him as head over all things to the church,

which is His body, the fullness of Him who fill all in all.

Yet today churches across this country and the world are guided by decisions at their earthly headquarters to conduct themselves in ways that contradict what God has revealed to us as the Holy Spirit presents His thoughts in Scripture (1 Corinthians 2:10-13).

Let's illustrate this point by using one single example that should bring the principle clearly into focus. The Catholic Church has authorized a system of hierarchy never mentioned in Scripture. They have Priests over the local church, overseen by Bishops who rule over many of these local churches in a diocese. Then the Cardinals which eventually lead to a Universal Bishop, the Pope. Now, in each of these levels of authority it is demanded these men remain single and celibate. This leads to rules and regulations above and beyond what Scripture authorizes, that is what Jesus authorizes as the One Who has all authority ...in heaven and earth and is ...head over all things to the church, which is His body.

Let us notice some of these deviations from Scripture. We will start from the top down. It is stated by the church Peter is the first Pope. First to be noted is nowhere in Scripture is Peter designated as having authority over the church except as authorized by the Holy Spirit to preach the gospel. Second, Peter was not single or celibate (Matthew 8:14,15). Third, the terms Pope is not mentioned in Scripture. As for Cardinals to rule over Bishops, there simply is no mention. Much like the writer of Hebrews says of Jesus being a priest of the Law of Moses. Jesus was from the tribe of Judah of which nothing is mentioned in Scripture concerning the priesthood (Hebrews 7:14). The silence of the Scripture on this matter was proof Jesus could not be a priest

under that Law. Can we see it could not be unless authorized in the Bible? Bishops in the New Testament serve to oversee the local church only. They were to serve as elders, bishops, pastors over the *flock among them* (1 Peter 5:1,2; Acts 20:28). As for priests or any single person overseeing any congregation, it simply does not comport with Scriptural authority because in every case there are elders over a church there is a plurality. Never is one man placed in any authority over the local congregation of God's people.

But we are told these things have been authorized by the Church. Simply stated the church is to be the pillar and ground of the truth (1 Timothy 3:15) and the truth comes from God and Christ (John 17:17; 18:37).

Who has authorized what you are practicing religiously? Is it the One Who has all authority or are you being deceived just as Eve was in the garden. Please realize the ultimate source of all deceit. Isaiah pleads with us to, Come now and let us reason together, says the Lord.... Isaiah 1:18. Please read for yourself what the Almighty God has spoken for you to follow. He will judge you in the end according to what He has spoken.

With the power of the gospel (Rom. 1:16), this person will, hopefully, realize the need to gather with the saints and get their heart right (Heb 10:25).
