# DRAWING STRENGTH FROM THE COURAGE OF OTHERS

How thankful we should be for wonderful examples of courage that spur us on to greater strength in the Lord's service.

Paul was just such an example: "And many of the brethren in the Lord, waxing confident by my bonds, are much more bold to speak the word without fear" (Phil. 1:14). These brethren, formerly timid and reticent, were drawing strength from the courage of Paul.

Other examples abound. Stephen's plea, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge," surely had for its source of strength the forgiving spirit of the Lord (Acts 7:60). The Thessalonian church found a source of strength in the example of the churches in Judea (1 Thess. 2:14). The Philippian church, a model of courage and conviction, could no doubt trace much of its strength back to the wonderful example of patience and equanimity demonstrated by Paul and Silas while in their midst. The Hebrew Christians were admonished to "remember them that had the rule over you, men that spake unto you the word of God; and considering the issue of their life, imitate their faith" (Heb. 13:7).

Christians of this generation are similarly drawing strength from the courage of others. Young men who refuse to miss services of the church to play on a ball team; young women who refuse to be seen in public in scanty attire; businessmen who would lose their jobs rather than compromise their convictions; women who continue to adorn themselves in "meek and quiet spirits" whatever the sophisticated world thinks or says of them; sick people who bear their afflictions with patience and faith; elderly people who continue to attend worship when they are hardly able to go

anywhere else; dying people who demonstrate how Christians ought to die; all are sources of strength and courage for others as they face similar circumstances. These all share a common spirit with the great characters of the Bible: they see in their temptations, trials, afflictions, and persecutions a special opportunity to be like Christ, to demonstrate their fidelity to Him, and to provide a source of strength for those who might be weak and wavering around them. They seize the opportunity and stand, and all of us are stronger because of them. Of these courageous people this world truly is not worthy.

Are we, however, to be always on the receiving end of the strength of others? As we draw strength from the courage of others, we must in turn become sources of strength and courage. Others look to us. Each of us has a "charge to keep," "God to glorify," and "a present age to serve."

#### THE VISION OF NAHUM

"The oracle of Nineveh. The book of the vision of Nahum the Elkoshite. A jealous and avenging God is the Lord; The Lord is avenging and wrathful. The Lord takes vengeance on His adversaries, and He reserves wrath for His enemies" (Nahum 1:1-2). Except for his prophecy, we know little about Nahum. He was from Elkosh, but there is little certainty about this town's location. Even the dating of Nahum is unsure. If Nahum 3:8 alludes to the fall of Thebes, then a date around 660BC is possible. Some argue that Nahum prophesied close to the fall of Nineveh in 612BC.

Thankfully, items of interest and debate do not obscure Nahum's message. Oddly, his name means "comfort" or "compassion." A surface reading of this short book points in other directions; along with other prophets (Isaiah, Jonah, Zephaniah) warnings about Nineveh which say that something ominous is about to happen.

Early Bible references to Nineveh include Genesis 10:11-12; Nimrod started his kingdom in Babel and then moved into Assyria where he built the city of Nineveh. Most Bible references to Nineveh warn about her fall and destruction. Jonah was reluctant to go to Nineveh; why should God give these persistent enemies opportunity to repent? In the New Testament, Jonah's story is connected to the risen Savior (Matthew 12:10-12; Luke 11:30-32). Like most ancient Middle Eastern cities, Nineveh was protected by false gods; Ishtar, goddess of love and war, served as the city's patron deity. The Assyrian king Sennacherib ruled from 704-681BC (1 Kings 19; Isaiah 37). After choosing Nineveh as his capital, the monarch began a massive rebuilding program; intricate canals and waterways linked the city to the palace; impregnable walls held at bay the king's enemies. Enter Nahum: "The Lord is good, a stronghold in the day of trouble, and He knows those who take refuge in Him" (1:7). God, though, was "against" Nineveh (2:13; 3:5).

Nahum's prophecy was an "oracle." The word points to a load or a burden that is lifted; lifting or carrying a load could be a burden. Tribute taken in war could be a load that was carried; this would be a welcome burden. This oracle, this burden, was God's judgment against Nineveh (and His judgment against us) and is rooted in His holiness. Harsh words, such as wrath, anger, and vengeance express distaste and hatred for sin. People given over to idolatry make God jealous. People steeped in idolatry, injustice, and brutality face the holy, judicial, righteous judgment of God. And His judgments are always right. Yet, thankfully, for you and me, God is patient and longsuffering. He will punish sin; but now we have opportunity to repent. The burden of sin is too heavy for anyone to carry or to even think they can carry that which is against God. Will we repent?

He used 2 mites to teach a great lesson on giving (Mark 12). He used some stones, a sling shot and a shepherd boy to overcome a giant and an army that had defied Israel (1 Sam. 17). He used a man of slow speech to lead a nation of people (Exodus 4). He used a little boy's lunch to feed a multitude (John 6). He even used a donkey in his service (Numbers 22).
